



within the pleat, and pressed down with rollers. Before passing out of the machine the paper is cut across into the requisite lengths for the wrappers, and, at the same time, short slits are cut at each side of the pleat, to enable it to be pulled back from either end when opening a packet; we make this style of wrapper in several sizes, and are always pleased to give our customers special quotations for large quantities.

### Printing Half-Tone Blocks.

In the current issue of "The Process Photogram," a very practical article appears on the printing of Half-Tone Blocks. The writer affirms that there is still much misconception amongst some printers as to the nature and needs of a half-tone block. If the paper, ink, machine, and machineman are what they ought to be, much of the time spent on over-laying is spent in damaging the results. If the paper, ink, etc., are not what they ought to be, padding will not greatly help the matter. The great drawback and difficulty of half-tone blocks is their extreme shallowness, and the use of soft packing, unless it is negatived by the stiffness of the printing paper, tends to force the paper into the hollows, thus intensifying the prime defect of the process, and increasing the need for washing up the blocks, which is too often the result of let-down ink. Continuing, the writer holds that too many machinemen have yet to learn two facts:—

 That the best impression ever seen from a good block is the flat proof, made without tinkering on a hand-press, by

the block-makers' proofer; and,

 That the best edition from half-tone blocks is run with make ready coming as near as possible to the hard flat impression of the proofing hand press.

Sir Vezey Strong, presiding at the 79th Annual Meeting of the Printers' Pension, Almshouse and Orphan Asylum Corporation, held on March 24th, at the St, Bride's Institute, said that he felt bound to congratulate the Council upon the fact that the past year had been a record one. £11,476 had been received, the greatest amount to be received in one year. Whilst the payments have been £5,445, the amount added to the investments is £3,000. The Chairman further announced that a valuable gift had been received from Mr. Andrew Carnegie, and was of opinion that the Council had reached a stage when their work was above criticism.

On the 19th ult., the printers employed by the well known printing firm of Paul Dupont, at Levallois Perret, went out on strike. The number of hands affected is 1,500, and the demand is for a uniform scale of wages for printers in Paris and in the suburbs.



# NEWS™BRIEF ®

Tanner's Trade Circular, April, 1906.

We are still constantly receiving letters from our customers complimenting us upon our Trade Circular. One received during the month is too good to be passed unnoticed, and emanates from a firm of printers at a popular sea-side resort on the East Coast, Our correspondent says :- "It will be a great help, but the only thing I am concerned about is the photograph of Mr. Garrett. What can be be so worried at? The photographs are put directly under the Printers' Pension, Almshouse and Orphan Asylum par., but the fact that such exist should not worry Mr. Garrett. He should feel like all poor hard-working provincial printers (like ourselves) that they form an excellent prospect for our old age." No, it was not the P.P.A. and O.A. that worried Mr. Garrett, but the fact that he had about two hours given him to get his photo taken and block made before going to press. [Eos].

In order to produce the blurred or marked effect of the typewriter when printing from type in imitation of faces used on the typewriter, the Printing Machinery Record draws attention to two methods that are in vogue in the United States. The first is to use crope chiffon, China silk, or ribbon cloth on the grippers; and the second method is to use the same material loosely locked over the forme. With either of these means the exact appearance of a type-written communication is obtained, and makes it possible for the name and address of the person addressed to be added to match the letter, which is a most important point in present-day advertising.

The International Printing, Stationery and Allied Trades Exhibition will be held in the Agricultural Hall, Islington, N., from Saturday, July 14th to Tuesday, July 31st. The management desire to make a distinct advance on the previous exhibition held in 1904, and with this end in view they are devoting, in addition to the Trade Exhibitors proper, special sections to Art Illustrations, Photography, Posters, Postcards, Illuminated Addresses, Showcards, etc. There will also be a special exhibition and competition for Classified Diplomas which will be open to printers in all branches of the craft. Profit-sharing may be termed a voluntary agreement Profit under which the employees receive a portion, fixed Sharing. beforehand, of the profits of the business. Some firms who have adopted the system distribute to their employees, according to their respective salaries, ten per cent of the profits of the year, over and above those of the year before the scheme was introduced. Whatever the exact terms of the system may be, it makes the workman feel that his interest lies in efficiency; that the better he does his work, and the more he saves his employer, the more will be his income at the end of the year. Those firms who have adopted the scheme state that whilst their output has been considerably enhanced, the cost of labour has not shown the same proportionate increase. It would therefore seem that Profit-sharing is a solution to the question of how to get from our workmen a good day's work for a good day's wage. Moreover, the system leads to a more harmonious relationship between employers and employed, and calls forth a personal responsibility on the part of each individual worker. Whenever an employer of labour has applied this principle to his business, three results have followed, namely: his profits have been increased, the workmen have received higher wages, and there has been altogether a better understanding between capital and labour. It assists very materially in putting a stop to the waste that is only too apparent in many factories, touching as it does the pockets of every assistant. It cannot be gainsaid that if Profit-sharing was more generally adopted in this country, it would enormously strengthen our industrial position, and it is a system that can be applied with equal success to any business no matter how small or large it may be.

# WHAT OTHERS " W, ARE DOING

Tarrer's Trade Circular, April, 1906.

To commemorate its anniversary number, the Los Angeles Examiner recently came out with an issue of 166 pages. About 150 tons of paper were used for this mammoth newspaper, and the proprietors were compelled to draw upon the resources of their contemporaries in order to accomplish the task of publishing. It is interesting to read that the advertisements in the issue ran to 670 columns, or equivalent to 90 full pages. Surely this is without parallel in the history of journalism.

The bookstalls on the Manchester South Junction and Altrincham Railway have now been taken over by Messrs. Wyman.

For some years about £80,000 has been annually paid into the Treasury by the Patent Office. As the Electrical Review states, this is nothing more nor less than a tax on brains, and in the case of the poor inventor is a prohibitive tariff.

In Germany, about five hundred million picture post cards are annually sent through the post. The Government Taxation Committee propose to put a tax of two pfennings on such cards. Should the proposal be adopted, it is estimated that it will bring in a revenue of £500,000.

At the last annual meeting of the Stationers' and Paper Manufacturers' Provident Society, it was reported that out of £1588 received. £1027 had been applied in benefiting members. £480 has been added to the invested funds, which now total £41,580.

Mr. F. Thomasson, proprietor of The Tribune, has consented to preside at the next festival of the Printers' Pension, Almshouse and Orphan Asylum Corporation. This will be the seventy-ninth anniversary of the Association, and will be held on May 29th at the Hotel Cecil.
