

OUR COMPETITION: RESULT.

OME months ago we inaugurated a competition for the best setting of a displayed advertisement referring to the "Salisbury" Embossed Blanks, and the "Salisbury" Covers. 

T is more than gratifying to be able to honestly announce that, from our personal experience, business seems to be brightening up all round. During the past month we have been exceptionally busy with general orders, and we trust this is an indication of increased trade among our friends.

For the first time in history a monthly journal has been inaugurated at Tokyo, Japan, printed throughout in Roman characters. The title is "Romaji."

An announcement is made that a new evening paper will make its appearance in London before the end of the year. A new halfpenny morning daily, called the Majority, is to appear in January next.

The editor of the Daily Mail announces that their advertisements amount to £350 per page, per day, which is said to be the highest price ever received by an English daily newspaper.

From the Civil Service Estimates for the year ending March 31st., 1907, we note that the gross cost of stationery and printing is estimated at £844,480. The printing for public departments amounts to £280,000, and the paper to £207,000, and the printing, paper, etc., for the two Houses of Parliament is £85,000.

Foolscap is, as everyone knows, a sheet of paper measuring 13×16 ins, and is used as a standard of size the world over. The derivation of the word is, perhaps, not so well known:—After the execution of Charles I., Cromwell and his subordinates did all in their power to remove everything connected with the old monarchy. The paper in official use had the crown as a watermark, and when the Protector was asked what substitution should be made, he directed a feel's cap to be used in place of the royal crown. It is more or less unfortunate that there are no Emphasis authoritative rules controlling display lines for Type Display. catalogues, pamphlets, and circulars. The canons for book-printing have been clearly defined and codified by Mr. T. L. De Vinne in his four volumes on the subject, but there is no similar treatise dealing with commercial work. If the same copy was given to a number of compositors to set, it is more than probable that they would all take widely divergent views as to which words required emphasis. In writing on this subject in a recent issue of The Printing Art, Mr. L. C. Gandy holds that the great fault of much of the display work of the present day is its originality. This qualification is, no doubt, very desirable in typography, but it is not the most important factor. Many seem to imagine that any rules or laws for display work would hamper its development, but this can hardly be the case, judging from the sister arts of painting and sculpture. In both cases, the best work has undoubtedly been done under rules laid down by recognised masters. A further delusion among many typographers, according to the above writer, is that the displaying of a title-page means only making it pretty. There seems need of protest against views so mistaken. Display is only a kind of amplified punctuation, to make more clear the meaning of a page than could be done with the ordinary marks. The wording of a title-page for a catalogue etc., should be dissected according to grammatical rules, and the relative size or importance of the lines determined by logic, which is but another name for common sense. Almost every catalogue cover, for instance, requires a different treatment, according to the trade it represents, but something conventional and less ornate than is usual would seem to strike the happy medium. A good deal can be done with rules and simple ornaments, if they are correctly arranged, but, very frequently, the balance of the scheme is entirely spoilt by a rule being placed but ar eighth of an inch out of the correct position. The only satisfact vay to obviate such mistakes is for the compositor to have "knowle" of the principles of design.

WHAT OTHERS PARE DOING

Beadle read an interesting paper on "The Development of Watermarking in Hand-made and Machine-made Papers." The lecturer gave a history of water-marks from the fourteenth century, and exhibited a screen of water-marked papers most of which were made in Italy. Amongst them there were some beautiful examples of water-marks in colours, and the products of one mill showed that they made a speciality of portraiture for their water-mark. The well-known miniature paper-making machine built by Messrs. Marshall & Co., was shown, in order to demonstrate the means employed for printing water-marks in paper.

The import duty, into the Australian Commonwealth, on "Paper cut to size and with ornamental edges," or manufactured stationery, is $25^{\circ}/_{\circ}$ ad valorum.

At the Royal Austrian Exhibition, at Earl's Court, there are a number of exhibits that will prove interesting to members of the craft, especially in the photo-mechanical engraving sections.

The appalling catastrophe and loss of life at San Francisco has played terrible havor among the newspaper offices. The offices of the Call, one of the highest buildings in the city, was entirely destroyed, the same remark applying to the Examiner building.

On May 25th, the annual conference of the Federation of Master Printers and Allied Trades of the United Kingdom, was commenced at Leeds, by the delegates being received by the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress. During the stay, visits to Otley, the seat of the printers' engineering works, Bolton Abbey, Roundhay Park, as well as to the machine shops in Leeds, were included in the itinerary. The Annual General Meeting was held in the Philosophical Hall, followed in the by the annual dinner.


