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

A Short History of Paper-Making.

O give a comprehensive history of Paper-making in the small space at our disposal, however concise it may be, is very difficult, but a few details of information on the subject may be of interest to our friends. Its origin is almost impossible to trace, but the making of paper from the flower of the cotton plant appears to have been practised by the Chinese in very remote periods. So far as the use of it in Europe is concerned it is known to have been introduced from Asia about the year 704 A.D. Damascus was the principal place of manufacture, and there it obtained the name of Charta Damascena. Many Arabian MSS., now extant, were written on paper that dated from the 9th century. The Egyptians used the leaves of the Papyrus plant for their writings, and this name was transferred to the material made from the cotton plant. There exists a record of the use of paper at the end of the 11th century by the Empress Irene, in her rules for the Nuns of Constantinople. In Greece it was not much used before the 13th century. The oldest document on cotton paper is a deed by King Roger, of Sicily, of the year 1102. In the British Museum is an example of paper written in an Italian hand of the first half of the 18th century.

The first makers of paper in Europe were the Moors, in Spain, the headquarters being Xativa, Valencia and Toledo. It was made also

This Circular is printed with our Jet Black Ink, No. 144, at 2/- per lb. in Italy, probably being introduced from Sicily by the Arabs—these papers were made exclusively from cotton. Subsequently rags of wool were mixed with the cotton, the latter material being more difficult to procure in the countries to which the manufacture spread, and then linen in those countries where it was more abundant. Early in the 14th century water marks first appeared in paper.

On the decline of the manufacture of paper in Spain, Italy became the most important centre of this industry, and several examples of paper made in Italy still exist, made in the middle of the 14th century, which shew its excellent quality. For some time Italy supplied the wants of Germany, but factories were very soon set up at Cologne Mainz, and at Nuremberg one was started by the aid of Italian workmen.

The first paper mills in France were introduced from Spain about the year 1189, the paper being made of cetton. Subsequently about 1400 the mills in France were called Moulins a toile, and so much paper was made, that France was able to supply other countries in addition to her own extensive wants. The texture of the early papers was coarse, and the wire marks very large; the water marks made by an impression with a rather thick wire, were very simple in design, these have aided in deciding the date and country of origin of the different makes. In the 15th century the paper became finer, and more elaborate water-marks were used; these marks were very varied in design—Coats of arms, warlike implements, Cardinal's hats, were used, and serve to identify the paper with the different countries in which they were made. Moreover, they prove to what an important position the manufacture of paper had attained in the 14th and 15th centuries.

The use of paper in England was not at all uncommon at the beginning of the 14th century. There is in the British Museum a record, the entries of which commence in the year 1309. This paper is made of cotton with a mixture of rags, the threads of which are visible, and resembles closely the paper made at that time in Spain, and was probably imported from that country, as the earliest record of an English maker is in the early part of the 16th century, a mill being then started at Hertford. But although no other mills are known to have existed, the general use of paper and its comparative eneap price in the 15th century would indicate that its manufacture to some considerable extent must have been carried on in England. The prices in the 14th century in England seem to have been about 8s. 4d. per ream of small folio paper; in the 15th century it ranged from 3s. 4d. to 4s. per ream. Brown paper for wrapping is known about the year 1570, and blotting paper at an earlier date. The first papers were made entirely by hand, and paper made by machinery was not manufactured until about 1804, in Hertfordshire, which gave a new impetus to the industry. Machine-made paper was gradually improved, and hand-made paper was and is now used only for special purposes,

N Austrian Inventor has discovered a method of making paper out of common marsh reeds. The product is claimed to be superior to that made from wood pulp or esparto grass, and almost as good as the paper made from rags.

We have secured from a high-class English mill over two hundred tons of super-calendered and mill-finished printings (white and tinted), in demys, double crowns, royals, and double caps. The total value of the exports of British writings, printings and envelopes for August was £112,784, as against £109,410 for the corresponding month last year. Whilst the exports of the month, to India, have decreased by a little over £4,000, the exports to Canada have increased by about the same amount.

In order to encourage the use of the trunk telephone wires at night, the Postmaster General has decided that, on and from the 1st October next, the charge for three minutes' trunk wire conversation between the hours of 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. is to be half the day rate, except in the case of calls for which the ordinary day charge for three minutes' conversation is 3d., 6d., or 9d. In the case of those calls, however, a double period of time will be allowed.

Professor R. K. Duncan, in an article contributed to "Harper's Magazine," states that it requires 650 mills, producing 80,000 tons of paper a week to fulfil our needs. After drawing attention to the fact that wrapping papers and news printings are made of disintegrated deal boards pounded and mashed and amalgamated into paper, the writer says that any one of the large daily papers consumes each day fully ten acres of an average forest, and to such an extent are the American forests being swent up into papers for the purposes that it urgently requires

We are pleased to see in "The Modern Lithographer," an appreciation, written by Mr. Colebrook, of a very old friend of ours, namely, the late Mr. William Day. He had a most eventful life, but whilst he may not have made a large fortune at any time, the litho work that the firm turned out has never been beaten, and perhaps never equalled. William Day was born at Gate Street, Holborn, in 1828. and was the son of a famous lithographer. He carried on the business of Day & Haghe, founded by his father, until it was turned into a Limited Liability Company, when Mr. Day resigned. In the end the Company went into liquidation, and Mr. Day took an office in Cockspur Street. To assist him in carrying on the business, he placed a quantity of valuable prints with an auctioneer to sell, who had been a personal friend for many years. They realised ten thousand pounds, but on the day of the Sale, the Auctioneer filed his petition, so that Mr. Day never got any of the money. This was his crowning disaster, and one from which he never recovered. At that time he had £20,000 worth of work in hand, but his affairs were wound up. As Mr. Colebrook says, there was not the slightest necessity for this as the estate yielded 19s. in the pound. Mr. Day was a splendid printer, and has left a name for good work of which any man may be justly proud.

Sir Joseph Wilson Swan, D.Sc., F.R.S., of electric light and carbon process fame, is said to have devised a method of reproducing and printing illustrations, which combines the intaglio or photogravure process of making engraved plates, with the lithographic process of printing. Or in other words, as the *Times* says, it combines the most perfect process of photo-engraving with one of the cheapest and most rapid printing methods. The development of such a method of illustration will have the effect of reinstating lithography to its former high position, and it will mean enormous modifications in the papermaking and book-binding industries.

There are said to be working in Germany 1,400 composing machines, whilst 2,087 hands are employed in operating them.

Canadian printers appear to be emulating the practises of their American neighbours. One of the Winnipeg dailies announces that the public is invited to inspect the printing press whilst at work, a special gallery having been erected, where seats are provided for lady visitors. The notice concludes as follows:—"Come in and make yourself at home." If we remember aright, some similar arrangement is in vogue at the printing works at Port Sunlight.

Lineleum for Tints.

Axono our residers there are, no doubt, some who have, as one time or another, used lineleum as a surface for tint plates, or even for large letters in After making enquiries, however, there appear to be many printers who are not familiar with the use of this commodity for such work as that mentioned above. Ordinary lineleum may be used, as it provides an agreeable surface to work from, but it must first be cemented to the mounting block, and the design either transferred to it or drawn direct on the surface. The only requisite to cut designs for tints, which are more or less regtangular in shape, is a strong,

exercised in cutting ornate designs, but it is wonderful what can be done in this direction with a little practice, and it is certainly worth the trouble, for it places immense resources in the hands of the printer, especially in the case of those who are not blest with over much material.
