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



rotary litho "tin" printing, done on the same stand, by the same firm, Messrs. George Mann & Co., Ltd. The ten colours were on paper.

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The estimating clerk of a well-known printing house in the city writes: "After a long and arduous experience, I must say that I generally find your house serves me the best, both as regards the paper actually required, and the right price. In fact, I turn now only to other samples in case of emergency, where particular shades of colour, or special papers, have to be matched exactly." This kind of laudatory epistle rather knocks the edge off our hitherto irreproachable modesty.- [ED.]

In a report published last month, the Select Committee on Official Publications drew attention to the wasteful system adopted in respect to much of the Government printing. The votes and proceedings have been printed by one firm, it appears, for 140 years, and the rate of payment has been examined by the Stationery Office, who estimate that after making ample allowance for the irregularity and late hours of the work, the necessity of careful revision of the proofs, and all other special circumstances, the cost is some 25 per cent. over what it would be if submitted to open contract. The Committee, therefore, recommended that the Controller of H.M. Stationery Office be appointed printer of the votes, proceedings, etc., and that he be made responsible for all technical matters of printing. This reminds us that the same Committee recommend the Government to have a printing department under its own control, where confidential and urgent work might be undertaken.

Travellers are like other mortals in so far as they require holidays. For this reason, together with our continually increasing business, it has been impossible for our representatives to call two or three times a week on our customers. We might mention, however, that any orders sent to us will receive the same personal and careful attention as they would if delayed, awaiting a visit from our traveller. We have been compelled to put an additional man on the road in London, on account of our enlarged clientèle.

The Musical Copyright Act, introduced into the House of Commons by Mr. T. P. O'Connor, received the Royal Assent on August 4th; so that it has now become the law of the land. According to the Act, every person who sells or offers for sale, or has in his possession any pirated copies of any musical work, shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction, and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five pounds, and on a subsequent conviction to imprisonment, or to a fine not exceeding ten pounds.

MORE DON'TS FOR PRINTERS.

- Don't forget that copying inks should be kept well covered with glycerine, otherwise they will soon become too dense.
- Don't make too many promises; they are often more easily made than kept, and a customer is more influenced by stubborn facts than by a thousand unkept promises.
- **Don't** let your paper buyer overlook the fact that R. T. Tanner & Co. make a feature of exceptionally prompt delivery of small orders: it is advantageous both to you and them.
- Don't be too ready to believe statements, made by interested parties, as to the existence of the "cutting" of prices.
- Don't overlook the fact that:—

HE mount may easily be half-a-dozen mounts; that is, our selected tint-sheets may be superposed absolutely flat and, to all seeming, parts of one stout multi-coloured board, the print being finally mounted on the topmost tint. Old, creased, bent prints recover their early vigour and pleasing aspect, so absolutely flat and adherent at all points do they lie.

The patent adhesive film which is the essence of the process both unites and separates. It unites the print and the mount; it separates any otherwise injurious chemicals in the mount from the print,

Burnishing effect is incidentally given by the hot press.

The prints cannot shift after placing, as they are secured by a touch of the hot iron at one point. Removal of the prints is easy, following the printed directions.

there will be little necessity for overlaying. The writer also points out that a roller which presses too hard upon the forme will deposit too much mk, while one that touches too lightly will lift a portion of the ink already laid by the other rollers. This fact can be taken advantage of by pasting pieces of cardboard on the roller bearers so as to slightly lift the roller passing last over the forme as it goes over the light lines, thereby removing any surplus ink that may be on them.

WHAT OTHERS TO ARE DOING

THE United States Department of Labour and Commerce states that the manufacture of paper from the fibre of the cotton stalk is one of the latest inventions to have passed the experimental stage. A company has been formed to exploit the invention, and it is said that it will increase the value of the South's cotton crop by nearly two millions sterling.

We have recently seen some very beautiful embossing which was done by Messrs. Suttley & Sons, Newcomen Street, Southwark. This firm is evidently making a speciality of embossed showcards, catalogue covers, folders, etc., and are turning out really high-class work with aerograph shadings, bronze lettering, etc. Speaking of embossing reminds us that we supply a special paper for the purpose, which is so tough that it stands the raising without breaking.

19,624,757 newspapers are published daily for six days in the week in the United States, and 11,589,521 are printed on Sundays. The amount spent annually in advertisements is £30,000,000, and the capital involved in printing and publishing is nearly £73,000,000.

HE remarks made, in a previous issue, in respect to the mixing of coloured lights, seem to have puzzled a few of our readers, and as there may be some who would be pleased to know the difference between the mixing of coloured lights and of coloured pigments, we have thought it of sufficient interest to explain the phenomenon from a scientific standpoint. If two correctly illuminated lanterns were throwing a disc on to the same portion of a white sheet, and a red screen was put into one, and a green screen into the other, the result would be a yellow disc, because yellow is the colour which is complimentary to red and green. With pigments this would not of course be the case, and the whole difference hinges on the fact that in one case we commence with darkness, and in the other with light, Suppose a piece of white paper is coated with a yellow wash, light falling on to the tinted portion has to pass twice through the colour before it is seen, namely on its way to the surface of the paper, and again, after it has been reflected to the observer. In this way the colour has absorbed the blue violet rays of light, so that this sensation is no longer excited in the eye. There remains, therefore, only the red and green sensations, and these, as we have seen, produce yellow. If the paper already tinted with yellow is now washed with a transparent blue colour, the result is green. The reason for this is that the yellow, as mentioned above, absorbs the blue-violet rays, leaving the red and green rays unaltered. The blue wash absorbs the red rays, leaving the green and blue-violet rays, so that their joint action is to absorb the red and blue rays, leaving only those rays to excite the eye which give rise to the green sensation.

Reverting again to coloured lights: suppose one lantern was throwing a yellow disc on to the screen, and a second was throwing a blue disc on to the same portion of the screen, in correct proportions, the result would not be green light, but white. The reason is that the yellow light excites the red and green sensations, the blue light excites the green and blue-violet sensations, so that all three sensations are excited, namely red, green and blue-violet, which, as already stated, are the three primary colours, and these in themselves produce white light.
