De Nobis.

HERF, are many of our customers, especially among those who have but recently become connected with the printing trade, who would, no doubt, be glad to hear something of our past history. For their benefit we give below a short outline of our origin and progress, showing the stepping stones, so to speak, whereby we have risen to our present position in the paper trade.

The business of B. T. Tanner & Co. dates as far back as 1864. It was founded by the late Mr. R. T. Tanner, in co-partnership with the late Mr. J. Hunt, at Upper Thames Street, where they traded under the title of Hunt & Tanner. This arrangement was carried on until 1877, when a dissolution of partnership was entered into, Mr. Hunt continuing the business at the original address, and Mr. Tanner commencing on his own behalf at the present address, 16, Dorset Street. This was in August, 1877. From that time the business has

gone on steadily increasing. We might here mention that Mr. Tanner had a life-long experience of the paper trade, and always took the kaenest practical interest in his business until his death in September, 1879. It was about this time that Mr. F. Garrett first became associated with the business, and for ten years it was carried on by the executors until Mr. W. A. Tanner, the eldest son of the founder, came of age. This occurred in 1888, and since that time Mr. Tanner has been actively engaged in the firm's welfare. In 1896, Mr. Garrett was made a partner; and in January, 1900, Mr. A. Tanner, the younger son of Mr. R. T. Tanner, entered the firm.

From the above dates it will be seen that we are by no means a young firm. From the inception of the business we have endeavoured to interest ourselves in every movement that has for its object the welfare of the printing trade. Naturally we have seen many changes, but it is most satisfactory, in looking over the pages of our first journal, to find the names of very many customers with whom we are still on the most friendly terms. To know that we have been doing business with so many firms for close upon thirty years, and still have their entire confidence and support, is a matter for which we can be justly proud. It is also interesting in looking over early records to note the difference in prices that exists to day to what was general in 1877. Paper which was then sold at 54d, per fb, and thought cheap, now sells at 21d, per th, and from what we can see there is absolutely no difference in the quality. All along the line there has been marked reductions, showing the effects of competition, and, incidentally, its value to the members of the craft.

At 16, Dorset Street, the order and sample departments are on the ground floor. Here also is the invoice department, whilst the general and private offices are on the first floor. The remainder of the building is devoted to warehousing large stocks of paper, each floor, as far as possible, being set apart for one particular class of goods. In 1809, the business had increased to such an extent, and the various qualities of paper were fast becoming so numerous, that it was found impossible to cope with the increasing demand at the one address. We were therefore compelled to look round for further warehouse room, but as we could not come across a building that was entirely suitable for our purpose, we purchased a plot of ground at the corner of Hutton Street and Primrose Hill, which is quite close to the Dorset Street premises. There we built a 5-floor warehouse adapted to our requirements. This was partially destroyed by fire on December 4th 1908, and we had to rebuild. The whole of the space in the building is utilised, the paper being stored in large racks that extend from floor to ceiling. We find this method of storage possesses many advantages, not the least being that the system prevents the outer wrappings from becoming broken. The machines for cutting, scoring, round cornering and deckling cards, are on the ground floor, Open to all our Customers, and their Employees.



Correct Estimating. The importance for correct estimating in the printing trade cannot be too strongly urged, especially in an age of keen competition, and when the bulk of the work

is given out to tender. On the estimating clerk hinges the responsibility as to whether his employer shall or shall not make a profit, and, in consequence, his position is a most important office. One must look to him to see that the work is produced at the lowest possible cost, which means that it is essential for the modern estimator to have a thorough knowledge of his profession. He must know the ins and outs of the craft, to enable him to decide how to produce the work submitted to him, efficiently and cheaply. If he sees a point, which another estimator does not see, whereby he can reduce the cost of production, his firm secures the order. In drawing attention to this subject some time ago, the *Progressive Printer* very truly remarked:—

"The most successful printers are those who, either of their own knowledge or through a competent estimator, ascertain the lowest cost of production of the work they propose quoting, and then charge as great a profit as the market will stand, which means that they must know the mechanical end of the business so well that they can decide promptly and correctly the proper method of producing the grade of work required at the lowest labour cost."

Consequently, an estimating clerk who is thoroughly an fact with his work, and takes an interest in his employer's welfare, is a valuable asset to the business. We frequently hear of printers losing work which they have held without intermission for years, owing to another firm submitting a much lower estimate. When it is possible to go into the details of such estimates, it is often found that the competing firm who have secured the order, has omitted some item from his cost, which results in a loss on the job. Of course, we know this is not always the case, but we mention the fact as it has often been brought to our notice. This state of affairs would not come about if every printer engaged none but capable men as estimating clerks; moreover, it would lead to a much healthier condition in the trade, and thus benefit the whole community.

In connection with the Stationers' Proprietary Articles Trade Association, a conference is to be held in the near future, in London, to endeavour to obtain uniformity throughout the country in the retail prices of proprietary articles. This step is being taken in order to prevent the "cutting" of prices which is now so prevalent in the trade.

If there is any truth in rumour, an American inventor has discovered a wrapping paper that is impervious to grease, acids, and water. It is also alleged that the paper is so strong that all other wrapping papers pale into insignificance in comparison. Of course; but it wouldn't be American if it didn't.

We regret to have to announce the death, on the 13th ult, of the Rev. E. C. Hawkins M.A., formerly Vicar of St. Bride's, in which parish our offices and warehouses are situated. Mr. Hawkins, who was in his 78th year, and father of Mr. "Anthony Hope" Hawkins, has not, however, been actively engaged in work in the parish for some eighteen months. His loss is mourned by a large circle of friends, for he was widely esteemed for his kindly benevolence, and was one of the most popular of city clergymen. Mr. Hawkins has written several books, including an important history of his church and parish. He always took the keenest interest in the printing trade, and was instrumental in bringing into being the St. Brides' Institute.

Turning over the pages of an almanack dated 1819, we read that there were then printed in London 14 daily papers, 30 weekly, and 7 papers published three times a week. The largest circulation of any paper, it appears, was 11,000 copies weekly, and this was issued from the "Observer" Printing Office. Comparing these figures with the million circulation that exists to-day of some of our dailies, one cannot but be impressed with the immense strides that have taken place in the printing trade. What changes will there be to report, we wonder, in the next 90 years?
