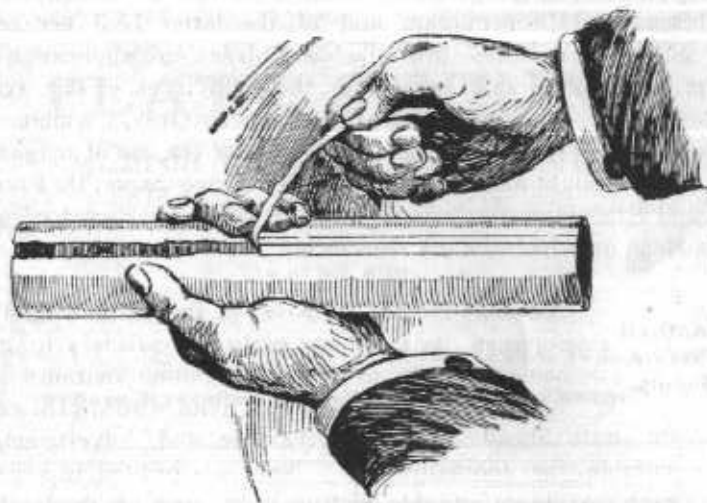

Mr. Spurgeon has evidently thus christened those who are spoiling everything for everybody, or in other words, those who are endeavouring, either knowingly or otherwise, to kill the goose that lays the golden eggs. The speaker came to the conclusion that, as between the booksellers and the authors, the publishers were the trade's mug-wumps.

At the final meeting of the honorary Advisory Council of the recent Printing Exhibition, held at the Agricultural Hall, a handsome illuminated address, subscribed for by the whole of the exhibitors, was presented to Mr. F. W. Bridges, the organiser of the exhibition, as a mark of appreciation. This was certainly a case of giving credit where credit was due.

A test case, as to the right of printers to work overtime is mentioned by the *Sales & Wants Advertiser*. It appears that the plaintiff had been in the service of the defendants for over eight years. On February 18th, at 6.15 p.m., he was told he would be required to work overtime, and as his trade union, the London Machine Managers' Trade Society, had decided that the men should not work overtime, he declined to go on. At 6.30, when he left, plaintiff was at once discharged, and a number of men were brought in, under a police escort, from the Labour Exchange, to take the place of those who left. The objection to work overtime was arrived at as a means of dealing with the subject of unemployment. The case was heard at the City of London Court, and our readers will be interested to learn that Judge Lumley Smith held that the workers should have given fourteen days' notice that they would not work overtime. As that was not done, he found for defendants, and he gave costs on the higher scale, as the case was of importance.

PRACTICAL NOTES

The Chemical Aspect of Printing.

(Continued from p. 139)

MACHINE-ROOM chemistry is also extended to the various substances which are added to the ink for such purposes as softening, lustreing, drying, etc. Unless the constituents of the ink and its auxiliary are in some measure understood, the result is dependent largely upon chance. The method may be correct, but the minder has no intelligent comprehension of the principles which account for the change. The same remarks apply to the various solvents and cleansers which are used to clear the film of ink from off the type or blocks. Every one of these actions is dependent upon the chemical nature of the bodies concerned. Many cleansers could be used which would rapidly remove the ink, but would seriously affect the type. To the lithographic branch of printing chemistry is a subject of paramount importance. This is realised by the technical instructors in the craft, and takes a prominent place on the syllabus. In the preparation of the stone or metal surface every step, except stone polishing or graining, has its principle based upon chemical activity. The litho. stone itself requires to be of a substance well adapted to withstand the action of certain reagents, whilst at the same time allowing other bodies to attack it. The whole art of printing from stone is based upon the chemical reaction between the fatty acid contained in the transfer ink and the alkaline earth, of which the German limestone is composed. The value of the metals used in the later era of lithography is also entirely dependent upon their chemical relationship with the various substances which are introduced during the processes involved in the preparation of the surface for machine. The evolution of metalography (or printing from flat metal surfaces) as a separate branch of the lithographer's art, is caused by the difference in chemical constitution of the metals, as compared with that of the calcium and magnesium carbonate litho. stone. The properties and behaviour are totally different in each case, necessitating an altered routine with new conditions. The reagents used on the stone surface exhibit new properties when in contact with zinc and aluminium. Thus this later phase of lithography occupies a new field because of the chemistry of the process.

which is also indirectly responsible for the class of machine used. There are also the chemical reactions which occur when such substances as acid, resin, chalk, gum, and the conditions of heat or flame are introduced, also the application of terebin and stearin. Again, in the effect of acetic acid on the stone. Often enough sour beer is applied to stone during running, to bring the job back. Probably it is unknown to most machinemens that the alcohol of beer is oxidised, or, more correctly, fermented, on exposure to air or acetic acid.

The chemistry of stereotyping is at a minimum, except in regard to the metal which may be identified and quantitatively estimated, with a view to turning out a regular product. There is also scope for experimenting in the production of a longer wearing and better moulding alloy. The value of adding certain other metals to improve the inherent qualities of the metal may be suggested by a familiar knowledge of the particular properties of the metallic elements. The last section for consideration is one which occupies a more advanced sphere of chemical science. Electro deposition or electrotyping belongs to the branches of chemistry known as electro and physical chemistry. The whole subject of electro depositing still offers a wide field for research, and much of the theoretical knowledge at present available concerning the actual principles of ionic deposition is hypothesis. Without the aid of theoretical electro chemists, electrotyping would never have occupied the position of industrial importance which it now does. The rate of deposition compared with current, and the methods of economical production of the copper shell, have been, and are being, gradually brought to a more perfect state by the aid of theoretical science.

WHAT OTHERS ARE DOING

THE New King George Stamps are to be printed by a firm fresh to the business of British postage stamp manufacture owing to the fact that the contract with Messrs. De La Rue & Co. will expire the end of the present year. The above firm have held the contract for 30 years, and it appears they have been cut out on price alone. Over five thousand million stamps are printed annually for use in this country.

A company, known as the Anglo-American Development Company, has been formed in Labrador, with a capital of twenty-five million dollars, to take over 12,900 square miles of forest for the purpose of manufacturing pulp. It is affirmed that when the undertaking gets into working order, America will be provided with an adequate supply of paper for an indefinite period.

* * *

Owing to the large number of pictorial cards and packets of eccentric shapes which are being sent through the post, the Postmaster-General is laying down some stringent regulations. If irregular shapes, e.g., imitations of shells, fish, etc., the lower edge and left hand edge of the address side must be straight and at right angles to one another. Packets containing collections of views must not be less than 4 inches in length by 2½ inches in width. The above regulations will come into force on January 1st next.

The amount estimated to be spent this year on Parliamentary Printing and Stationery is £739,596, which is £70,000 less than it was five years ago.

The Cleveland Guild of Printers, Lithographers, Bookbinders and Kindred Arts and Crafts has issued its fourth annual report and balance sheet, for session 1909-10. Nineteen members have been enrolled since the last annual meeting, bringing the total up to 187, an increase of six. In his presidential address to the annual Conference of the Society of Chemical Industry Mr. Reman, principal of the John Hopkins University, Baltimore, made a severe attack upon Sunday newspapers, says *The Daily News*. Speaking of the conversion of the forests in the United States, he said they were being rapidly and ruthlessly destroyed, and that the manufacture of wood pulp paper made cruel inroads on them. "This drain," he continued, "is, perhaps, largely the result of a depraved state of mind on the part of the people who seem to delight in masses of trash served up in the form of the daily newspaper, and especially the Sunday newspaper. I wish I could avoid this subject. I am filled with shame when I think of it, but this depraved state of mind is so closely connected with the forest problem that honesty compels me to mention it. There are many newspapers, even Sunday newspapers, in the United States, which exert a wholesome influence, but besides these there are others which tend only to lower the mental and moral condition of their readers. The point is that these are the largest in size and circulation, and they, therefore, affect the forest problem most seriously."
