Tanner's Trade Circular, Jan., 1910.

INDER the auspices of the Senefelder Club, an exhibition of lithographs is being held this month at the Goupil Gallery, Regent Street, W. Exhibits will be on view from wellknown litho, artists, together with the work of members.

Recently, at Cardiff, a printer was summoned for printing a leaflet not bearing an imprint. The magistrate informed the defendant that he was liable to a penalty of £5 for each of the leaflets distributed. However, as the defendant pleaded that it was an oversight, he was ordered to pay 10s, and costs, or go to prison for seven days. When will the printer learn that the law must be obeyed, even if the law is an ass ?

This reminds us that a firm of printers in Dublin were recently summoned for not having a guard on a platen machine. The firm in question appeared to have been notified of this omission on two occasions by the Inspector of Factories, but had ignored his instructions. Result: a fine of £1 and 1/6 costs. Here again, we cannot understand how it is that some printers run such risks.

Arrangements have been made with the Government of Newfoundland for the extension to that Colony of the privileges of the Canadian magazine post, whereby the postage rate on British newspapers, magazines and trade journals is reduced to 1d. per lb.



The Company demanded £11 5s. for carriage. If the same roll had been sent from Berlin to London the carriage would probably be under one pound.

Another find for a bookstall loiterer—this time it is a youth, who, for a nimble half-penny, bought from a barrow in the Mile End Road, a copy of Goethe's poems enriched with Thackeray's signature, crest and thumbnail sketches. He sold the volume for £20.

JUNEAU CHARLOCKER

At the Annual Dinner of the London District of the Institute of Journalists, the Hon. Harry Lawson gave a cheque for £500 for the Orphans' Fund of the Institute. This brings the total of the Fund to £1,000.

A writer in the *Illustrated English Magazine* gives an interesting account of the printing department at Scotland Yard. Four times a day a broadside is issued to all the police officers. At nine in the morning the first issue is sent out, giving an inventory of all property lost. At noon is issued a list of all persons missing, and this often occupies several pages. At half-past six the broadside contains both subjects, and a further edition is published at 10.30. An habitual criminal register is distributed, and every few days an account of persons released on tickets-of-leave is published. A sheet of missing articles is sent to every pawnbroker, which necessitates 4,000 copies of this document being printed.

The proceedings were presided over by Mr. R. H. H. Baird, president of that body, and Mr. E. Taylor Tomlinson, secretary of the Linotype Users' Association, was present to support the contention of the employers. It was contended that the operators engaged on jobbing work were entitled to the same rate as those employed on evening news, viz., 1s. 3d. per hour; but, after a lengthy discussion, it was mutually agreed that the rate payable in future should be 1s. 1d. per hour.

It is reported that the Master Bookbinders' Society have drawn their customers' attention to an increase in the price of leather, which will necessitate an advance between 72 and 10 per cent. on all estimates for binding.

Some Notes on Printing Papers. WRITING in *The British Printer*, Mr. H. A. Maddox states, in respect to paper, that the main point to the machineman is its finish, especially when doing illustration work. He mentions the

three classes of surface (broadly speaking) namely, coated, imitation and uncoated. The first consists of a body paper coated with a species of clay mixed with glue, the material forming the body paper being an important point with regard to ease in working. The best art papers are from esparto fibre coated with barium sulphate and glue, whilst China clay is used in cheaper papers, which also often contain a large percentage of mechanical wood pulp in the body paper. In this case the tear is exceedingly brittle, and it also turns the following solution crimson, if a drop is poured on to the paper:—

Phloroglucinol 2 grams: absolute alcohol 25 c.c.; 'hydrochloric acid pure, 5 c.c. Mr. Maddox also holds that the degree of fixation for the coating is an important point and may be roughly determined by the following tests:—

- (1.) Moisten the ball of the thumb and press it against the paper.
 If the clay adheres to the thumb then the coating is poor.
- (2.) Cut a square of the paper and rub it against itself. From the loosening effect of the clay the degree of fixation can be determined by comparison.
- (3.) Glue a strip of ordinary writing paper on to the coated paper to be tested. Allow it to dry and then try to remove the strip. The extent to which the coating is lifted indicates the quality.

If a paper is really coated it will give a black mark if rubbed with a silver coin. Imitation arts merely give the impress of the coin, owing to the clay being added to the pulp and not to the surface.

Owing to the great amount of pressure used in finishing, the surface of super-calendered papers often deteriorates greatly on exposure to moisture. This is due to the fibres in the paper LIST OF

re-assuming their original position and consequently destroying the surface. Being, however, a more genuine paper in itself than imitation or real art, it is to be preferred where line blocks are being used and where durability is some consideration. Mr. Maddox draws attention to an important matter, and one which should receive more attention than it usually does, namely, the handling of paper. The correct way to lift paper is to take hold of two diagonally opposite corners and let the paper hang in the centre. The method wrongly adopted is to grip it at the two sides and force a point up by pressure from underneath. A crack is bound to occur at each side, and it is impossible ever to get the kink out again. Stretching and shrinkage are among the chief causes of trouble in paper required for register work. To a certain extent this evil can be remedied by the printer himself.

Most paper stockrooms of any dimensions have a relatively low temperature. When the paper is stripped from its wrapper and transferred to the printing room, which is always several degrees higher than the paper warehouse, it immediately begins to absorb heat enough to bring its temperature in equilibrium with that of the room. The consequence is that some of the moisture evaporates from the fibres, and they contract imperceptibly, until there is a noticeable difference in the size of the sheet. Unfortunately the shrinkage is unequal, being greater in the machine way than the cross way of the web.

From this explanation, the necessity of working thoroughly matured paper will be obvious. In some classes of colour work, as for instance long bands or slips, advantage may be taken of the knowledge of cross and machine way to print the job the way up which will lessen the effect of expansion or shrinkage.

There are one or two simple methods of ascertaining with accuracy the length and cross way of the paper. The best method is to cut a circle about six inches in diameter, having previously drawn two lines through the circle and on to the sheet, both the circle and sheet being marked so that the circle can afterwards be placed in the exact position it occupied previous to cutting out. Damp one side of the circle, being careful not to damp the other side, allow it to lay on a dry place wet side up for a moment, and it will curl up into tube shape. The way through the tube is the machine direction of the paper.

To overcome the difficulties dependent on temperature, the safest method on particular work is to hang the sheets up for a day or so. It is an unwise policy to hang the sheets on ropes or lines. The best method consists of clips attached to the ceiling.

WHAT OTHERS TO ARE DOING

THE last annual report of the "Ladies' Pictorial and Sporting and Dramatic" Publishing Co., Ltd., shows a profit of £16,130. The latter gathered speed until it overlapped the smaller motor and took up the lead. By these means the printing machinery got a smooth run from the start, and the jerk, which was apt to break the paper, was avoided. The defendants challenged the validity of the patent on the grounds of absence of novelty and prior publication. Mr. Justice Neville claimed that the plaintiff's case failed, as it had already been published in this country in connection with American machines. The patent was, therefore, bad, and the action for infringement failed.

A conference was held at the Mansion House last month, under the presidency of the Lord Mayor, to consider the subject of Industrial Education and Apprenticeship. Mr. Cyril Cobb, L.C.C., opened the debate by affirming that the reform most urgently needed in elementary education was that which should give to the pupils a power of general adaptability such as would fit them to more readily grapple with the difficulties of industrial life. Sir Thomas Wrightson drew attention to the benefits of apprenticeship. He said that the chief obstacle was apathy on the part of the parents and on the part of the trade unionists. Mr. Nicholls, National Union of Teachers, held that elementary education should not be made purely industrial, but on the contrary, opportunity should be afforded for a child to reach the very highest posts. In the speaker's opinion the age to leave school should be raised to 15. Sir W. Bousfield, Chairman of the City and Guilds Institute, called attention to the work done by the City Guilds, and went on to praise the valuable efforts of the apprenticeship committees now working in various parts of London. He urged that employers should take more interest in the welfare of the young people in their workshops. Mr. Friend, of the Vellum Binders' Trade Society, was of opinion that indiscriminate apprenticeship was a great evil, for it meant cheap labour. It was the general thing for the apprentice to learn from the journeyman, and then for the journeyman to be dismissed. He asked what was the good of suggesting that Trade Unions should have control of the apprenticeship system? Would the employers allow the Unions control of the workshops?
