





A COMPROMISE has been arranged in the dispute between masters and men in the Edinburgh printing trade. The masters agree that no new female learners shall be taken on till June, 1916, and that all new keyboards shall be given to males for five years.

A further advance is announced in colour photography. The invention in the present case is the simultaneous exposure of the three plates in the camera. Hitherto the three plates have been exposed separately, as in the Sanger-Shepherd method, the one through the red filter requiring considerably longer exposure than the one through the blue filter. It would be interesting to know how the filters are arranged so as to allow a simultaneous exposure.

Still another announcement is made that London is to have another evening paper. On this occasion the scheme seems to have taken some tangible form, for a company has been formed under the style of the London Evening Newspaper Co., Ltd., to carry out the project. It is to be published at a halfpenny, and will be Unionist in politics.

The British Acting Vice-Consul at Hakodate, Japan, states that the paper factory there, which has been under construction since 1907, is the largest in the Far East. It has cost £714,500, and the production will be limited to paper for books and newspapers.

Henry Sell, of Hartington Mansions, Eastbourne, late managing Director of Sell's Advertising Agency, left £36,062, and desired to be buried in unconsecrated ground. Mr. John Craig, of Trafford Lodge, Nuneaton, and of the Moffatt Paper Mills and Caldercruix Paper Mills, Airdrie, left personal estate valued at £77,162. Mr. James W. Goodinge, of Gower Street, W.C., head of the firm of Messrs. Goodinge and Son, printers, left estate of the gross value of £16,969. The will of Mr. J. S. Ferrier, senior partner in Oliphant, Anderson and Ferrier, publishers, Edinburgh, shows an estate valued at £10,975.



The objects of the association are to provide, by the voluntary contributions of the members, for the following purposes:—The relief or maintenance of members during temporary unemployment; the endowment of members at any age; insuring sums of money to be paid on the death of a member, or for the funeral expenses of a member's wife or husband. Simplicity and Harmony.

WRITING in the Caxton Magazine, on modern display work, Mr. E. Morley holds that simplicity and harmony are the most important factors in modern typography. He says that recent years have seen a great advance in the style of display work, but there is still much

room for improvement. Typefounders in their specimen sheets, and numbers of good printers, both in this country and America, have shown that good work can be done with a single series; but still too many of our compositors will insist on showing a collection of half-a-dozen discordant faces in one job. Now, while "one job one face" may be too idealistic for everyday usage, it should surely be possible to give sufficient variety of tone and strength to a job with two distinct faces. The tendency of the present day is towards a sane and simple style. The aim of the modern job comp. should be to interpret in the style of the day the message conveyed by the job in hand. That this message can be conveyed in a simple manner equally as effective as the elaborate and time-consuming designs of twenty years ago is evident from even a casual inspection of work from our best printers. Simplicity of design should be the first consideration. While a job may be set in plain type, and all in one series, this element of simplicity will still be lacking, unless the whole of the message intended to be conveyed is readily comprehended. To ensure this the job should be considered as an arrangement of lines and masses of type and ornament, and these must be divided and placed in such a manner that their proportions are pleasing. Each one of these lines and masses is a point or force of attraction, and it will be apparent that we must have few of these points of attraction to have a really simple design. To spread out the matter to fill a given space appears to still be the aim of many job compositors, and this frequently leads them into the error of too much spacing between the words and lines. It is true that display means "to spread out," but another, and perhaps better meaning is, "to exhibit," and this can be done better very often by not spreading out so much. All type faces are designed with the object of being read, and to aid this a small amount of space between the lines is

allowable and frequently necessary; but an inspection of even a small number of jobs will generally show a majority with some part too widely spaced. Most compositors are aware that the space between words should be equal to the average width of the letter; but many appear to think that legibility is attained by excessive space between lines. Not only does this extra space fail to ensure legibility-it frequently spoils the beauty of the design of the letter itself. No hard and fast rule can be laid down, as a black face will stand a little more than a light one, but probably one-half of the depth of the face is the utmost space that can safely be placed between lines of type without weakening the general effect. If more space is required to fill the page or space, let it go short, but see that the matter is placed in the proper position.

Another point requiring care is making the shape of the printed matter harmonious with the shape of the page or panel. We often see a job set so wide that the side margins are too small and the top and bottom margins excessive. When this happens the novice promptly places more space between the lines, weakening the page and making matters worse. With a little calculation as to the number of lines the matter will run to, the mass can be set of a shape which will harmonise with the page or panel without extra

space between the lines.

Harmony of shape should also be kept in mind in the choice of letter. The shape of the letter should conform to the shape of the page. Nothing can be worse than using a condensed letter for an oblong page. Letters with long ascenders, such as Cheltenham, require less space than usual between the words. This widely used and beautiful letter is frequently spoilt by wide spacing, when closer spacing would give the page a more pleasing tone. Spaced with middle spaces it will look much better than if en quads are used, particularly if set solid. When leaded, a little more space is naturally allowable, but wide spacing should be avoided at all costs.

It may be found necessary to make two or even three lines of a main feature, so as to keep the job harmonious, but modern usage sanctions this. We might also take a lesson from artists, who, when they are designing a title page or book cover, do not scruple to divide a word rather than sacrifice the unity of their work.

WHAT OTHERS TO ARE DOING

THE old established business of Sweeting & Co., Printers and Publishers, which dates back to 1824, has been purchased by Messrs. Page & Thomas, Ltd., who are continuing at the same premises, Dyers Buildings, Holborn. The entire staff is also being retained, the only alteration being that additional and up-to-date machinery is to be added. Page & Thomas, Ltd. are making Dyers Buildings their head office, and anticipate the plant will be of considerable service to them in further developing their growing business. We are informed that the facilities at their country works, Chesham, Bucks, are also being increased.

On Michaelmas Day, Alderman Sir Vezey Strong was elected Lord Mayor of London for the Coronation year. He has been a member of the City Corporation for more than ten years, and is the representative of the Queenhithe Ward. Sir Vezey, who is an ardent worker in the temperance cause, is a Past Master of the Stationers' and Plumbers' Companies, a representative of the City and Metropolitan Water Board, and an officer of the French Legion of Honour.

The last annual report of George Newnes, Ltd., states that the profits for the year amounted to £35,065, which is an advance on the previous year's trading. A dividend at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, per annum was declared on the ordinary shares, and the sum of £2,744 was carried forward. The late Sir George Newnes is succeeded by his son, Sir Frank Newnes, as chairman of the company. The annual report of the Aberdeen University Press, Ltd., shows a profit of £4,397. The directors recommend that £1,000 should be written off the book value of the company's machinery and plant, that £250 should be added to reserve, and a dividend at the rate of 5 per cent., per annum, paid on the ordinary shares. At the annual meeting of H. R. Baines & Co., Ltd., proprietors of the *Graphic*, *Daily Graphic*, and *Bystander*, a dividend was declared on the ordinary shares at the rate of 7 per cent, per annum. The plaintiff ordered 200,000 envelopes, and as they were not supplied to time, they purchased elsewhere at a price 3d. per 1,000 higher. The defendants said that a German firm failed in delivery and this caused them to fail the plaintiffs, and that the German firm should be looked to if damages were sought. The law is particularly clear on this point, and the plaintiffs had certainly clear cause for damages against the defendants. In such cases it is for the defendants to take up the matter with their Continental manufacturers, which is always a long process unless the firm in question has a branch in the particular country in which they are bringing the action.
