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



In the House of Commons Mr. Lansbury recently asked the Prime Minister if his attention had been called to the fact that a contract for the supply of stamps was entered into between the Government and a private firm in the year 1901 without competition being invited, and that the amount paid on account of this contract was £97,000 per annum, and that it has now been discovered that the estimated profit was more than £40,000 per annum, which is now being saved owing to competitive prices having been obtained. Mr. Hobhouse, who replied, said that although there was a saving on the new contract of £40,000 a year he could not say how much exactly of this sum was actual profit to the late contractor. It does not follow that because this saving has been secured for the future a similar saving could have been made by a competitor in 1899.

According to the London Gazette, the Secretary of State for the Home Department gives notice, pursuant to section 80 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, that he has certified the process of applying dry metallic powders to, or dusting them off from, surfaces previously printed or otherwise prepared, in Letterpress Printing, or Lithographic Printing, or Coating of Metal Sheets, to be dangerous, and that he proposes to make regulations to apply to all factories and workshops in which such process is carried on. Copies of the regulations proposed to be made may be obtained on application to the Chief Inspector of Factories, Home Office, London. Objections to the draft regulations by, or on behalf of, any persons affected by the regulations must be sent to the Secretary of State within forty days from the date of this notice.

Judge Rentoul said at the Institute of Printers' Dinner that no invention had at all approached printing in its power over the human race. Even the telegraph and steam sank into insignificance in comparison with that which printing has exercised on every department of life.

The annual general meeting of the Federation of Master Printers and Allied Trades of the United Kingdom will be held in Belfast from June 9th to June 13th. The members of the trade in Belfast are preparing for the event, and are anxious that it should be signalised by a record attendance. The programme is an exceptionally interesting one, and we can imagine the visit of the Federation to the Emerald Isle will be one to look back upon in years to come.

It cannot be denied that the printing trade of Germany has more or less centralized in Leipzig. There are in the town 170 printing establishments, 156 book publishers, 370 newspapers, etc., 70 type-founders and machine shops, 22 music publishers, and 450 agents connected with the trade. The number of persons engaged in the trade is over 60,000.

A machine has been invented for opening envelopes. In shape it is somewhat like a cash register, and opens twenty envelopes at a time without cutting the enclosures.

The inventor of the gummed postage stamp, says the Sales and Wants Advertiser, was a Scotsman, Mr. James Chalmers, of Dundee, who, in 1834, suggested the adoption of the practical system of affixing adhesive squares of paper to envelopes. Mr. Chalmers was ridiculed, and, among others, medical men predicted

that the constant licking of gum would be prejudicial to the health of the nation. It was not until 1841 that the plan of Mr. Chalmers received the serious attention of the post office authorities.

At the annual staff dinner of Messrs. Cassell & Co., Ltd., a gold cigarette case was presented to Mr. A. Spurgeon, J.P., the general manager, on the occasion of his fiftieth birthday. In making the presentation, Mr. Golding said the gift represented the pennies collected from 1,676 members of the staff.

The Hon. W. F. D. Smith, principal of Messrs. W. H. Smith & Son, recently gave the land at Denmark Hill, at a cost of £70,000, for King's College Hospital. He has now undertaken to defray the cost of one of the centre ward blocks of the new hospital, which is estimated to cost £30,000.

The will of Mr. A. Street, of Messrs. Street & Co., Ltd., advertising agents, shows an estate valued at £5,214. That of Mr. W. Notting, of Bowling Green Lane, E.C., is valued at £4,915 gross and £3,747 net. He bequeathed £1,000 for a "William Notting" lifeboat and £500, in the hope that it would be used for a lifeboat-house, to the National Lifeboat Institution; a sum sufficient to endow three pensions to the Printers' Pension and Orphan Asylum Corporation, to be known as the "William Notting Pension," the "Pierre Notting (Luxembourg) Pension," and the "Sophia Notting Pension," these pensions being given to the applicants who have been longest on the unsuccessful list.

That the Caxton Convalescent Home at Limpsfield, Surrey, is appreciated is evidenced by the fact that 162 male employees in the printing and kindred trades were received during the past year, nearly all of whom returned to their work in renewed health and strength. Funds are urgently needed to carry on the good work during the current year and to enable the trustees to liquidate the building debt of £700, the balance of the loan with which the home is burdened.

The Art of Seeing.

THE following extracts are from an extremely interesting lecture given by Mr. J. Albert Cooper, and are continued from our last issue:—We will see, therefore, what place balance occupies with

relation to jobbing composition. Most designs may be analysed in a similar way to a spray of "creeper." Take a page and divide it vertically through the centre. A well-balanced design will not show too much heaviness on either side. There may be certain features such as a main mass placed more to the left or right when we view the page as a whole, but when we look at it from the central line, that large mass must be so disposed that the amount showing on the left-hand side is balanced by the addition of smaller masses or lines on the right hand side. It may happen that while our large mass is composed of small type set close-giving a grev effect-our smaller masses may be a heavier head-line or a line or two in another colour, in which case our larger mass will not want to be so near to the centre as would be the case if the larger mass were the more prominent feature. In the case of book pages, with the possible exception of the title and half-title, if any, we must consider not each page by itself, but the opening as one page divided in the centre by the fold, in which case our outside margins should be larger than that between the pages. As to how much larger must be to a certain extent governed by the shape of the book, and whether it is an "ordinary" or "good" job; though it is usual in the case of "fine" editions, such as those of William Morris, to make the margin on the fore-edge equal to that between the two pages. In the case of title-pages, Morris (and several of his imitators), finding the page by itself on the right of the opening to be objectionable, as having nothing to balance it, overcame the difficulty in some instances by making a bordered title on the left-hand side, which balanced the first page of text beginning on the right. As, however, there are few cases where this can be done in ordinary practice, the title must, it seems to me, be treated by itself, and if there is a blank page in front of it, the fact of the title being nearer to the back than the foreedge will not be found objectionable; and as the old saying has it,

"Of two evils choose the lesser," so, where it cannot be avoided, it is better to have the title in the back, rather than to make all the other pages centre or come nearer the front. The next subject is harmony, which is the just adaptation of parts to each other, so as to form a symmetrical and connected whole, and implies, I think, not merely a passably satisfactory arrangement, but such a one as shall give positive pleasure to the beholder. Harmony is of many kinds, and so subtle is it in detail as to make it exceedingly difficult to give an adequate explanation of any of its features-this is proved by the contradictory statements of most of the writers on the subject. While proportion, rhythm, and balance are more or less subject to scientific rules, harmony, especially colour harmony, is so intimately connected with feeling that unless you have that feeling for harmony -a natural sense of what is right-the only thing you can do is to follow good examples as far as possible, and so avoid making gross errors. First, as to colour harmony. The worst error an inexperienced person can make is to endeavour to be "original"-that is, in its usual sense, of inventing something "out of one's own head." True originality is individuality developed by a long and careful study of principles which are as old as nature, and any attempt at invention, apart from knowledge, evolves only bad work and a mistaken sense of one's own importance-whereas the more one studies and learns nature's secrets, the more one feels the vast amount yet unlearned. Good work rarely shows all its qualities on the surface or to the casual observer; its beauties must be studied to be appreciated. It is far better to learn the control of a few colours. such as red, black, brown, green, and orange, and see how these colours are arranged in nature and by the greatest craftsmen, than it is to be continually trying experiments with various so-called "art" colours, without having obtained mastery over the simpler ones first. And you must not understand, when I say "simpler," that I mean the use of any combination of colours to be thought of as simple-for it is not so; but where you have black as one of the inks, you have not quite the subtlety and delicacy that you have when black is absent. The observation of nature, and some general hints, will help to educate you, if your faculties are merely untrained; but no one can produce good and inventive colour work who has not a natural liking for it. You cannot master it, as you can the letters of the alphabet, by sheer plodding. That there must be a natural gift for colour harmony is easily seen by taking a simple example, a job in red and black. Now, I may tell you, and you may have seen, that properly used, red is one of the most beautiful colours to liven up, and make handsome, a page of wellprinted black; but you must have just the right quantity of red.

WHAT OTHERS TO ARE DOING

A MEETING was recently held at Caxton House to promote the idea of amalgamating all the unions of the printing and allied trades in London. The following resolution was carried unanimously:—" That this meeting of the London printing trade unions is of opinion that there should be but one printing union in London, to embrace all grades or sections where labour is primary or tributary to the printing industry-" The meeting also organised itself into a society under the title of the London Printing and Allied Trades' Amalgamation Committee.

According to the Caxton Magazine, a facsimile reproduction of the first book to be printed from movable types, namely, The Gutenberg or Mazarin Bible, is to be published. The prices will vary from £30 for an unbound copy on ordinary paper to £136 for a vellum copy in four volumes, bound in full morocco. The reproduction will be, like the original, in two folio volumes, containing 1,282 pages.

At the last annual general meeting of Messrs, Cassell & Co., Ltd., it was announced that the accounts show a profit of £28,346 for the year, which is £6,000 in excess of last year. After allowing for interest on the debentures, and with the balance brought forward,

there was a net balance of £26,070 for appropriation. Whilst the directors believe that the policy of conserving the finances of the company should still be pursued, they recommended, in view of the increased profit, that the dividend should be raised to $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Of the balance £6,000 was placed to reserve, £8,000 to copyright equalization account, and £2,126 carried forward.

Messrs. Hodder & Stoughton have hit upon a novel scheme with the object of bringing out latent talent. £1,000 is being offered for the two best novels, the first prize being £600, and the second prize £400. The competition is open to all, and there is no entrance fee.

Presiding at the fourteenth annual general meeting of Financial News Ltd., Mr. G. Flower stated that the profits for the year amounted to £45,110 3s. 10d. The directors recommended a final dividend of 5 per cent., making 10 per cent. for the year, together with a bonus of 5s. per share, making a total distribution of 35 per cent for the year. £5,596 4s. 4d. was placed to the ordinary reserve fund, and £7,500 to the establishment of a second reserve fund. In addition, the directors decided to distribute the sum of £3,000 to the members of the editorial, reporting and business staff as a bonus.

It is satisfactory to be able to report that the Printers' Medical Aid Association is in a healthy condition. From the last quarterly report we notice that whilst the receipts were £148, the expenditure was but £83. The funds of the Association stand at £359, an increase on the previous quarter of £65.

There are farthing idaily papers in St. Petersburg, Moscow and Odessa, and yet the nation in which they are published is not over-enlightened. Is it that the literature is too cheap?

Lord Minto will preside at the anniversary dinner of the Newspaper Press Fund to be held at the Hotel Metropole on May 11th.
