

STRIKES.

CINCE our last issue we have passed through a national calamity in consequence of the railway strike and the strikes in other industries which were brought about in sympathy with the railwaymen. August, 1911, will be remembered in history as the month of strikes, and for some days at least, commerce was practically at a standstill. A state of things prevailed which was unheard of before, and at one time there seemed to be no knowing what the ultimate result might be. It is regrettable that such a thing as a general strike of organised labour can be brought about in the highly developed state of society in which we live, and it is to be hoped that some means will be devised to prevent such an impasse occurring again. "Arbitrate before you fight" is an old-time maxim which appears to have been totally ignored, to the detriment, we believe, of all the parties concerned. Even if Capital is dependent upon Labour, Labour is also greatly dependent upon Capital, so that there must be reciprocity, otherwise there can only be chaos. Don't let us be misunderstood: We quite agree with a living wage for all classes of labour, for the labourer is certainly worthy of his hire, but are strikes the most satisfactory way of securing this end? We cannot think so, When they have come about and peace has eventually been declared, the labourers themselves oft-times ask the question "Was the game worth the candle "? Some more economical way of settling trade differences must be diversed, both in the interest of master and man.



The
"Amphitype"
Process.

THE inventor of this photo-litho, process read a paper recently on his invention, which is reprinted in the Caxton Magazine. We extract therefrom the following notes:—

The Amphitype Photo-Litho. Transfer Process affords a ready means of impressing on the surface of a photo transfer, developed on a ready sensitised photo transfer paper, anything that can be photographed in a camera, into a lined or into a grained or stippled negative. For line work in particular its efficiency can scarcely be exceeded, whilst for stipple work in the larger grains the results are very satisfactory.

Of the superior excellence and quality of the line impression there can be no question. I submit to your inspection many examples of Amphitype transfer impressions on zinc plates. Most of these are just as the ink copy has transferred to the metal without any subsequent treatment whatever. They have not been touched up or inked up or in any way manipulated in the slightest degree. They have only been gummed up to protect them, and are ready to hand over to the lithographic printer to etch up and prepare in the usual way for printing from. I draw your attention to the perfection of the transfers. Not a line is missing—no spreading has taken place—whilst the ink is present in such body as to afford ample scope in the subsequent treatment of the plate in preparing for printing purposes.

I also submit a few samples which have been worked up and printed from, and for fineness of work and minuteness of detail I beg particularly to draw your attention to the drawing of a locomotive. The plate was prepared from an Amphitype paper transfer by a student of the Liverpool Technical School who had not touched zinc work previous to this year. I submit the plate, and prints therefrom. I think you will admit that for litho, surface printing work by photo paper transfer the fineness of detail could scarce be exceeded. It is almost as good as an engraving.

These examples illustrate how the whole body of ink has transferred from the paper to the metal, intact, and in full substance-

I don't think I exaggerate when I say the impressions are as good as if obtained by direct photo printing on zinc plates for all ordinary commercial purposes. The impressions obtained, when on the surface of metal plates, will serve for either surface printing or for etching up into type blocks for letterpress purposes.

A Unique Process. For nearly three generations, since Poiteven introduced his bichromated gelatine photo litho, transfer method, the printing trade has relied on the bichromates as the photo sensitive chemical agent

used to produce the physical changes in a prepared gelatine film under the action of light, which enable it to hold the ink in the form of a picture, and so yields a photo-lithographic transfer print.

But Poiteven also pointed out that the iron salts could be used for a similar purpose, and he gave to the world his positive photolitho, transfer process, known to this day as the Poiteven process. I have never heard of any very general adoption of this process. He confined his attention exclusively to the use of water as a solvent, and that too only of the exposed parts of his film that had been acted on by light. He was thus only able to produce positive copies of translucencies.

Now I claim to have gone one better than Poiteven in my treatment of the iron film, inasmuch as that I make use of a water solution of ferro-cyanide of potash as a solvent of the unexposed parts of the film, thus producing negative copies of photo transparencies, and bringing the iron salt methods more into line with general photographic practice, and more particularly with recent photo-lithographic practice. In fact my Amphitype film is a direct parallel to the bichromatic film inasmuch as that I produce a soluble photo sensitive gelatine film on the surface of paper that so hardens under the action of light to certain solvents that it will not wash away.


It is a well-known fact to chemists that a water solution of ferrocyanide of potash will combine with a ferric salt of iron to produce a Prussian blue, also that it will produce a soluble Prussian blue; but these facts were only hitherto made use of photographically to produce positive blue line copies of engineer's tracings by the Pellet or cyanofer blue line copying process.

The idea of producing photo copies in pigments or in litho transfer inks through this agency was not thought of. The fact that the solubleising action arising from the formation of the soluble Prussian blue would extend itself to the colloid film was not recognised or made use of. This I claim to be the first to have concentrated attention on, and to have applied practically in the production of positive pictures from negative translucencies in pigments, and more particularly in litho, transfer inks for photo-litho, transfer purposes

WHAT OTHERS TO ARE DOING

I T is announced that the society and fashion newspaper Madame has been purchased by the proprietors of the Throne and Country.

The report of Messrs. Weldons Ltd., shows a profit of £39,116. The directors recommended a dividend at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum and placed £8000 to reserve, whilst £1000 was allocated for a bonus to the staff. The last annual report of Messrs. C. Arthur Pearson, Ltd., shows a profit of £43,131. The directors decided to pay a dividend on the ordinary shares at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum, although sufficient profits were available to pay 20 per cent., and to reserve £5000 for special advertising. The directors of London Opinion, Ltd., have declared an interim dividend of 75 per cent., making 150 per cent. for the last years' trading.

The businesses of Messrs. George Allen & Sons and Messrs. Swan, Sonnenschein & Co. have been amalgamated and will in future be carried on under the style of George Allen & Co., Ltd. The registered office is at 44 and 45, Rathbone Place, W.

An international exhibition, the cost of which is estimated at £296,000, is to be held next year at Bilbao in Spain. It is proposed to invite the United Kingdom and Portugal to take part in the scheme.

The United States Government have brought an action, under the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, against the so-called Magazine Trust. According to the Sales and Wants Advertiser, the magazine publishers supply subscribers either direct or through middlemen. One important class of middlemen consists of subscription agents, who are supplied at wholesale rates by the publishers and sell at retail rates to the public. These Agents by extensive advertising, circularising and personal solicitation have largely increased the sales of the magazines, and at the same time they have enabled the

public to purchase magazines at lower prices than by direct purchase. This has been done especially, by means of "clubbing" together two or more different periodicals. The Government's case is that in July 1909, a number of leading publishers combined to form a "Periodical Clearing House." This organisation prepared an official price list of about 3,000 periodicals. It is alleged that the subscription agents were coerced into signing a contract that they would not sell any of these periodicals at prices lower than those fixed, and that in the case of periodicals outside the list they would sell them only at the regular publication price. Nearly every club order contains at least one publication issued by a member of the Clearing House, so a subscription agent who refuses to sign the contract is virtually put out of business. Complaint is made that public libraries are compelled to pay higher rates for their magazines than formerly so that, under the Act, the defendants are charged with being engaged in an unlawful conspiracy to destroy competition, to restrain trade unduly, and to monopolise parts thereof. It will be interesting to see what the ultimate result of the suit will be.

A progressive movement in technical class instruction, which the Caxton Magazine has long advocated, has been brought about by the Council of the Borough Polytechnic Institute. In future, day practical instruction for apprentices will be given and the instructor will devote his whole time to the service of the classes day and evening. This new departure has been made only after long and serious consideration by the Council of the Institute and the teaching staff. The chief reason for its adoption is that after three years of close observation and study of the results of theoretical instruction only, those interested came to the conclusion that the progress made by the apprentices attending the day classes was by no means commensurate with the efforts made on their behalf.
