A CCORDING to the last Day Census returns, there are over 50,000 workers in the various branches of the printing industry in the City of London. The industry stands as the greatest employer of labour in the City. The next trade, drapery, being 15,000 lower.

The next Printing, Stationery and Allied Trades' Exhibition will be held at the City Exhibition Hall, Manchester, from April 17th to May 1st. next. The organising manager is Mr. Frederic W. Bridges, and the Hon. Secretary is Mr. R. Hilton. Already sufficient space has been let to well-known firms, and enquiries for positions received from others, to ensure a successful Exhibition. Plans and forms of application are now ready and may be had on application.

On July 1st., the most comprehensive Copyright Act that has ever been enacted will come into force, and certain industries are looking forward to the Bill with a considerable amount of jubilation. Reference is made particularly to the Kinematograph and Talking Machine trades. On the other hand, some of the publishers think that the State has left a gap which must be filled. In the past, the registers at Stationer's Hall supplied a fairly complete catalogue of copyrighted works. Under the new Bill, no provision is made for the registration of books, so that Stationer's Hall will no longer be a source of information in this direction. A writer in the Athenæum suggests that that paper should issue the publishers' lists. They should be as full and complete as possible and supplemented at regular periods by a complete index.

The will of Mrs. Stannard, better known under the pen name of John Strange Winter, shows an estate valued at £547 10s. 10d. gross. The Daily Mirror says this is a sadly meagre result of thirty years' continuous writing, during which time the novelist published 103 novels. According to her husband, "John Strange

become established as a trade practice, though not allowed as a legal "custom" by the courts—namely, the practice of making sketches free of cost.

"That the Board of Trade be asked to pass a law as early as possible, preventing any person describing himself by any trade or profession who is not genuinely occupied in, or has not the plant necessary for, that trade or profession." Such is the terms of a resolution passed by the Halifax Typographers Association. It has been considered by the Federation of Master Printers, who decided to bring the matter before the various Chambers of Commerce and have asked the Government to initiate legislation.

This reminds us that a movement is on foot in the United States to reduce the number of persons without capital and experience being supplied with the necessary plant and credit to start them in the printing business. Such firms are said to cut prices, injure established concerns, and finally go out to let others come in. Although there may be something in the argument, it opens a very delicate problem, otherwise it might resolve the trade into a Trust. Most of the larger printing establishments in this country commenced in a very humble way, but their steady and slow growth has ensured a sturdy and robust adolescence.

Early last month an experimental service of the new telegraph letter system was inaugurated between London and Belfast, and London and Aberdeen. By this system letters may be sent by telegraph at the rate of 36 words for sixpence. They are sent from the receiving office to their destination as an ordinary letter, and therefore dispense with the services of the telegraph boy.

You pay your money and take your choice.—Some authorities have been telling us recently that the supply of wood pulp was limited, and must cease within the lifetime of the present generation. Now we are told that the spruce land of Labrador can supply the world for a few centuries, and that Quebec alone can supply all the requirements of the United States for the next half century.

A deputation waited upon the Post-Master General in respect to the C.O.D. Parcels Post. It appears that there is no hope at present for the cash-on-delivery system being extended to this country. It seems somewhat strange that such is the case, especially when the system is in vogue between our own country and certain Colonies, as well as Egypt.

Bronzing. MR. J. W. ROBERTSON contributes a very interesting and practical article on this subject to *The* Sales and Wants Advertiser, from which we have

Now that the authorities are making such stringent regulations in regard to bronze printing of all descriptions, most large printing houses are needlessly fighting shy of this effective and beautiful style of printing. A tin of bronze preparation can be obtained from any printing-ink maker. The method usually employed to reduce this special ink is the addition of a quantity of thin varnish, wax varnish, or solid oil. In some cases I have even found the machine-man adding paraffin oil. When I asked him the reason for doing this, he told me that the preparation pulled, and that he found that paraffin always stopped it instantly. I wonder how many printers realise how detrimental all these additions are to the finished production? The remedy for this is obvious. Always purchase your bronzing preparation from a reliable maker-and then give strict instructions to your machine-man that this ink must not on any account be tampered with. In the manufacture of this preparaation certain definite quantities of varnish and other ingredients are used, and the manufacturer must be relied upon to know how much of each will give the best result when all are combined and milled together. If the ink requires any thinning at all, let it be done with a liquid such as spirit of turpentine, that will soon evaporate again, and leave the ink as it was intended to be. Users find that spirit of turpentine is the only reducing medium that is required, and if you have got a good preparation to start with, your bronze will not rub off again when it is dry-a fault for which the ink has often been blamed when the real fault lies in the way it has been worked-The ways by which you can tell a good preparation are these: It takes the bronze readily; the work does not rub off; it dries fairly fast; the bronze does not tarnish quickly.

The bronze powder should be applied as soon as possible after the preparation is printed. The reason for this is that the preparation has not had time to settle down, and consequently gets a better



grip on the powder than it does when allowed to stand-even for a minute. Users should always purchase as good a bronze powder as they can afford. It pays better to get a smaller profit on a job and to get it again than to get a large profit and lose the work next time through using inferior bronze. Moreover, good bronze is not nearly so dangerous to the worker as cheap bronze. Where a considerable amount of work is done, a thoroughly efficient bronzing machine must be used. The authorities are very strict upon this point, and rightly so, because the copper contained in the powder is very injurious to health. Milk has to be supplied to the workers that are using it to prevent ill effects from the copper in the body. If the bronze is applied by hand, the best method is this. First obtain a piece of fur such as a rabbit skin, and tack it to a wooden holder so that it can be handled conveniently. Take a very small quantity of bronze upon it, and go all over the work as lightly and as quickly as possible; then increase the pressure slightly to burnish the bronze. You cannot rub the bronze into the preparation too much, but do not rub too hard, or you will rub some of it off with a little of the preparation, and your fur will get clogged, and the work spoiled. On some papers and cards you will find that no matter how carefully you work, the bronze will cause a dark smudge wherever it has touched the work. This is due to the fact that various mineral products have been used in the manufacture of the paper. A little French chalk added to the bronze will generally correct this. Then comes the dusting-off of the surplus bronze powder. Some use a slightly damp cloth. This prevents the surplus powder from flying about the room-but the dampness will cause the bronze to tarnish much quicker than anything else. Some use a piece of rag or cloth-but that soon gets clogged up, and they go and shake it in some other part of the room to the discomfort of everyone in the place. This is one of the causes of the strict regulations that are enforced by the Government. The most effective method I know is to have a liberal supply of cotton wool, so that when a piece of it is full of the bronze it can be rolled up in a piece of paper, and thrown away or burnt. Hand bronzing, however, will soon be a thing of the past, for up-to-date methods bring better financial results, as well as better sanitary conditions. When bronzing is carried out under safer and cheaper conditions, there should be a very much wider market for that class of work, as the chief difficulties, namely, cost of production, danger to health, and damage to stock, will then be practically overcome.

WHAT OTHERS TO ARE DOING

THE third exhibition of the Senefelder Club for the advancement of artistic lithography, held at the Goupil Gallery, was a pronounced success, and proved the advantages of the process in its adaptability to the personal technique of the draughtsman.

What is considered as the largest single advertisement ever appearing in a daily newspaper was published in a recent issue of the Chicago Examiner. It ran to 20 pages, and at the ordinary rates would cost about £4,000. The Fair Store, which gave the advertisement, is one of the largest mercantile establishments in Chicago, employing some five thousand clerks.

In Germany there are about 25 playing card factories which exported in one year 1,410,941 packs of cards. During the same period, only 83,698 packs of cards were imported into Germany.

We live in an age of bustle, but, for smartness in this direction, the Daily Mirror will require, we imagine, some beating, in the way they outdistanced all competitors with the Durbar photographs. The event was held on December 12th, and the illustrations were being printed at 3.0 a.m. on December 30th. The photographer travelled via Brindisi, and on arrival at Calais there was a special steamer chartered to take him to Dover. On the passage across the blocks were made, every convenience having been fitted up for the purpose. A special train ran from Dover to St. Paul's Station, and to save time, the matter for describing the pictures was sent from the steamer by wireless telegraphy. Such is the way one is expected nowadays to keep going in order to be abreast of the times.

cards, price lists, lists or catalogues of goods dealt in or for sale, catalogues of estates for sale and the like; if printed by letterpress, bank notes, bills of exchange, promissory notes, bonds or securities for the payment of money, bills of lading, policies for insurance, letters of attorney, deeds, agreements, transfers, or assignments of stocks or shares, receipts, law proceedings, and papers printed by authority of Parliament, or of any public board or public office." It may be pointed out that obedience to the law, if general, will entail no hardship, but rather the reverse, as the printer obtains a gratuitous advertisement, while the knowledge that payment cannot be recovered, unless imprint is insisted upon, will prevent a customer threatening to remove his work on that account, for he will find others will make the same stipulation. There have been several cases recently in which customers have pleaded non-liability on account of the imprint not appearing. Lately special attention has been paid to newly-published books, and it is found that many are without the printer's name and address as required by Act of Parliament. As customers frequently object to imprints, being in ignorance of their own legal liability in case of omission, members are warned that any agreement to print books or papers without imprint is illegal and void Should you omit the imprint, even by desire of your customer, you will (according to repeated rulings) be unable to recover for such work, and be liable to a penalty of £5 per copy."

in 1751. During the year following the Halifax Gasette, which was the first newspaper to be published in the Colony, made its appearance from the same premises. This reminds us that the word "Gazette" is derived from the name of an Italian coin worth about a farthing, and was applied in the early days of journalism to a newspaper which sold at that price.

A method by which paper, cardboard and fabrics may be rendered insect proof has been invented. This is accomplished by impregnating the material with a decoction of sweet flag root or with a composition prepared by boiling a mixture of rosin, naphthalene, soda crystals, and water into a soap and mixing with starch paste. When the paper, etc., is treated in the pulp stage, alum is added to the second composition. When the paper is treated after manufacture, the alum may be omitted, and, after impregnation, it is passed through animal size. The sweet flag root and the resinous composition may be used together. - Caxton Magasine.

A catalogue of printing and allied subjects added to St. Bride Library since 1900 has just been issued. It is compiled by the acting librarian, and includes over 250 titles on General Typography, Materials, Composition, Proof-Reading, Presses and Machines, Stereotyping and Electrotyping, Design, Administration, Illustration and Bookbinding. The 250 titles noted are not of course inclusive of all the books published since the century began in connection with the graphic industry, but it is an exceptionally useful and instructive addition to the technical library of the St. Bride Foundation, which, by the way, is by no means so much used as it should be, especially by students.
