

industries of the United States in the value of products; and it ranks fifth in the number of wage-carners. There are 31,445 printing and publishing establishments, employing 388,466 persons, 75 per cent. being males, 22.4 per cent females, and 2.6 per cent. under sixteen years of age. The report also shows the power used in such establishments, and is as follows, the figures representing horse-power: Electricity, 229,312; steam, 59,240; gas, 32,152; water, 2,320.

From May to October, 1914, there is to be an International Exhibition for the book industry and graphic arts at Leipzig. The exhibition is intended to create a friendly competition among all civilised nations in the graphic arts and industries, to show the important influence that the book industries exercise on the education of the public and to demonstrate the prominent position that the graphic arts and industries occupy in the lives of nations. Speaking of Leipzig reminds us that the town is credited with having about 60,000 persons engaged in the printing trade, and with producing more than 10,000 tons of printed matter annually.

Prizes of the value of fifteen guineas and ten guineas respectively are being offered for designs for the backs of playing cards by the Makers of Playing Cards Company. Particulars of the competition may be obtained from Mr. W. Hayes, Clerk of the Company, Guildhall, E.C.

The London Evening Times has ceased to exist, and the promoters are said to have lost £80,000 by the venture. Two months ago the company went into liquidation,, and the staff, both literary and mechanical, determined to carry the paper on as a co-operative concern. This, however, has not proved successful. The old Morning Leader has also disappeared, having amalgamated with the Daily News, under the style of the Daily News and Leader. It was the first half-penny morning paper in London, and had been established for about twenty years.

One thing which struck us very forcibly at the International Horticultural Exhibition, just closed, was the high standard of printing adopted by the trade. Catalogues, which in many cases were real works of art, were distributed broadcast. Good printing and horticulture should undoubtedly go hand in hand, and we were pleased to find that this was the case.

Four cases of lead poisoning were reported to the Home Office from printing establishments in March. This makes six cases for the year, as against eleven for the corresponding period of last year.

It is rumoured that a member of the Conservative party in the Reichstag, will shortly present a Bill for the taxation of advertisements. The publishers and allied interests in Germany are making a vigorous stand against the possibility of such a measure.

It is proposed to hold an exhibition at Stationers' Hall, from June 25th to June 29th, inclusive, to illustrate the history of printing in England from its introduction down to 1800. The range of the exhibition will be roughly from Caxton and Wynkyn de Worde to Baskerville, the well-known eighteenth century printer.

Correct Spacing and Line Justification, THE following rules in regard to spacing that should be remembered but are often disregarded are given by the *Practical Printer*.

Justification. "Space as evenly as possible, taking into consideration the formation of the letters on each side of the space.

"Never employ an en quad and a thin space together. Always two thick spaces. They are easier to distribute.

"Take out a thick space and put in an en quad rather than add a thin space.

"In setting circulars or book work, if heavily leaded, space with 'nut' quads at least. This lets the daylight in between the words and renders the type the more easily read.

"Less space is needed between words where a comma intervenes.

"A thin space should be placed before a colon or a semi-colon, interrogation or exclamation point. A 'nut' quad should follow the former two, and an em quad the latter two except where they are used at the end of a sentence.

"A thin space should be placed each side of a dash or quotation marks.

"If after having a line evenly spaced it is still unjustified, place the extra space preferably in the centre of the line rather than at the end; between such words as 'would be' in preference to such wards as 'as it.' By so doing the uneven space will not be so obvious; in fact, a little more space is necessary between words that end and begin with tall letters.

"Use as few pieces as possible and justify the lines thoroughly so that the matter will be solid as a plank and as easy to lift. This rule is absolutely essential to good spacing."

In letter spacing, the jobber should be careful to preserve an equal amount of space between each letter. For instance: Less space is required between the open capitals "L" and "A" in "INLAND" than between the "N" and "D." No job of letter-spacing can be perfect where this rule is not obeyed.

Good line justification, like good spacing, is absolutely essential to good workmanship—a mechanical detail that should not be neglected. There are but few job compositors who are not cognisant

of this fact, yet it seems that only a small percentage take the time to justify a line or group of lines as they should be justified. This may be accounted for in some offices by lack of the necessary material in the shape of hair spaces. In others quantity is preferable to quality, and for this reason the work is slighted.

The job compositor should make it a point to thoroughly justify a job. One resourceful jobber of the writer's acquaintance manufactured hair spaces with sheet zinc. Good justification requires time; the employing printer or foreman must admit that it is time well spent and grant it. Wise is the employer or foreman who, when hiring a jobber, instructs him to the effect that if, by taking ten minutes extra, he can improve a job mechanically or artistically, to take it by all means.

The requirements for good justification are: First, care and patience; second, time; third, equipment. The first, the good workman must have and exhibit; the second and third the employer must furnish him.

Justification and spacing are so intimately related that he who is master of one is usually master of both.

At the Newspaper Press Fund Dinner, the chairman, Lord Grey, said:-"The gentlemen of the Press appeared to be the 20th century reincarnation of the old time crusaders. They rode forth animated by a spirit of high courage to fight the forces of ignorance, unfairness, and all manner of evil. No sacrifice appeared to them too great, no exertion too strenuous, no privation too severe, if any or all were necessary to be faced in order to enable them to achieve the ideals of their inspired and disinterested journalism. The late Mr. W. T. Stead embodied, perhaps more fully than any other, the characteristics of the journalist crusader. To make, not to record history had ever been his noble and disinterested ambition. He was a man with a mission, and journalism had been the organ through which he wrought it."










WHAT OTHERS TO ARE DOING

THE changes in rates of wages in the printing trade, during the first quarter of the year, affected 977 persons, whose wages were increased to the total extent of £71 per week. For the same period of last year, only 28 persons were affected, and the gross weekly increase was about £1.

We have often heard the remark that there are fortunes to be made out of waste products. A trade journal has been started by Messrs. Maclaren and Sons, Ltd., under the style of "Waste Trade World," to cater for all branches of the waste industries. It appears that old collars and cuffs come to England from Germany to be used for the best hand-made paper. Old twine and string are sent to the Continent for the manufacture of cigarette paper.

During March, the Labour Exchanges received 2,708 applications for employment in the printing and allied trades. The number of vacant posts notified was 932, of which 746 were filled through the exchanges.

A correspondent of the London Evening News sets out to prove in the following ingenious way that Shakspere wrote the Psalms: "In the word 'Shakespeare' there are four vowels and six consonants. Four and six placed together form the number forty-six. If the forty-sixth Psalm is turned to it will be found that the fortysixth word in it is 'shake,' and the forty-sixth word from the end is 'spear.'" But the spelling of Shakspere's name in the way given in the Evening News spoils the fun, for it contains five vowels and six consonants-hence the theory fails to convince. Perhaps this is not the fault of the correspondent, but of the newspaper, where it may be that, as was once the custom on the Daily News, the order was given out to spell "Shakspere" "with all the letters"-hence it was always printed "Shakespeare." The great poet spelled his name, and other things, in all sorts of ways. This is a weakness of really clever people-we find ourselves doing it at times. - Printers' Register.

109,500,000 picture post cards were sent through the Swiss post offices, last year, an increase of 7,500,000 on the preceding year. It appears, therefore, that the picture post card craze is not altogether dead, as has been rumoured in some quarters.

Since the advent of paper-bag cookery, says the Sales and Wants Advertiser, house-wives are finding that paper can be put to an extraordinary number of household uses, and are welcoming its incursions into the realms of domesticity with open arms. Paper towels are now much in use in America, and they are gradually coming into household use in England. A packet of paper towels taken out by a picnic party or campers-out will prove themselves to be a boon and a blessing, for the first clear brook that the party rest at, the heat and dust of the walk can be removed, and the soft paper towels will dry the skin as well as any made of damask or the softest huckaback. In America many people furnish their week-end cottages with paper curtains, which can be obtained over there in a damask design, with the daintiest border of roses, and it is hard to distinguish them from the "real thing," while paper serviettes, d'oyleys, towels, and handkerchiefs stock the linen chest.

The last report of Standard Newspapers, Ltd., states that the revenue has been satisfactorily maintained, although the expenses have been increased, owing to improvement in the company's newspapers and to the railway strike. The net profit is £6,268. The preference dividend was paid and a balance carried forward.

Printing press manufacturers of the United States appeared recently before the Senate Finance Committee in opposition to the Underwood Tariff Bill, which places printing presses on the free list. Mr. D. E. Titsworth, of the Potter Printing Co., told the committee that the present duty of 30 per cent. is none too high, and that any further reduction would make it impossible for American manufacturers to meet competition from abroad. He stated that 75 or 80 per cent. of the cost of printing presses manufactured in America is represented by the cost of labour, with from 20 to 25 per cent. for material. He declared that American manufacturers are now unable to compete in foreign markets.-Caxton Magazine.

The appropriate suggestion is made that a bust of the late Mr. W. T. Stead should be presented to the Institute of Journalists by the newspapermen of the United Kingdom, as well as a "Stead Endowment" of the Orphan Fund.
