Calendars.

FROM Messrs. Taylor Bros., of Leeds, we have received samples of a number of almanacks for next year, which we feel sure will appeal to our readers. Probably the most popular will be the commemorative design referring to the Antarctic Polar Expedition; the background is printed in a shade of subdued green on superfine enamel paper, measuring $22\frac{1}{2} \times 17\frac{1}{2}$, the portraits being printed in a suitable photo brown.

The central panel contains a fine portrait of the intrepid leader, Capt. Scott, the other portraits being Capt. Oates, Dr. Wilson, P.O. Evans, and Lieut. Bowers. Pendant to the principal oval is a shield containing an extract from Capt. Scott's rough notes, as will be seen from the accompanying illustration. The price of the sheets only, is 35s. per 100, and wood mounts are 3s. 6d. per 100 extra. We venture to predict that this calendar will have an immense sale. In colour work the following will be found to be up to the



high standard for which this firm is renowned: — "Jealousy"; "Two strings to her bow"; "A hard winter"; "A close call"; "The Star of Bethlehem"; "An awkward fix"; "Rough weather, Whitby," and "A nor'-easter, Scarborough," two beautiful panels; "Phoebe"; "You must be friends"; "Feeding time," after Yeend King; "A Highland lassie"; "Motherless"; "The Huntsman's daughter," and "Feeding the Cattle," a fine study of Highland cattle. In monochrome we must mention "A fair critic" and "The Betrothal." It will be seen from the above that there are subjects to suit all tastes, and they are all exquisitely carried out.

PRACTICAL NOTES

The Progress of Offset Printing.

A LITTLE over five years ago *The National Lithographer* announced the introduction of the first lithographic offset press into New York. At that time nobody knew just what the new process was going to accomplish, but the practical lithographers freely predicted that the process "would not amount to much."

After studying the machine and process carefully *The National Lithographer* predicted that the offset press would revolutionise lithography. That by it lithographic printing could be done better, quicker and cheaper than by any other process so far in use.

As will be remembered, this prediction was not received with much enthusiasm in the trade. It was with difficulty that even the most progressive lithographers could be induced to even consider installing the new machine. Some even refused to go and look at it.

At the end of about a year there were a few offset presses (Harris model) installed in New York City, and they then began to attract considerable attention in the trade.

The work done on them was practically all black and white commercial work, and the reports made by the "experts" who looked into the process were generally unfavourable. These unfavourable reports were brought about mainly by the fact that those who had installed offset presses and were operating them at great profit, were inclined to discourage competition.

All this time *The National Lithographer* continued to extol the merits of the offset press and predict a great future for it, while the flatbed press advocates condemned the process, the press, and everything connected with it.

Slowly at first, and later with increasing speed, the offset continued to gain ground, until to-day practically all the commercial lithography in the United States in black and white is done by the offset process, and many of the leading colour houses have installed "batteries" of these presses. The American Lithographic Company, for instance, which is one of the leading establishments in the country, has a battery of eight, running chiefly on colour work.

Some of the finest effects ever seen in lithography in the United States are, says our contemporary, the results of the offset process. Specimens of colour work up to twelve colours are seen every day, and it is safe to say that every lithographer in the country either has installed at least one offset or is contemplating such a move.

There is no kind of work in the lithographic field that cannot be done with an offset press. There is work being done on offset presses to-day that cannot be done by any other process known.

The offset press has done everything that it was predicted it would do. There are over five hundred of these presses in operation in this country to-day doing work that would keep fifteen hundred flatbed presses busy, and doing it better than any flatbed press could do it.

Offset presses are successfully working on every thickness of paper from ten-ply cardboard to tissue paper. Type work is being done on the offset press better, cheaper, and quicker than it can be done on a type press. Old stone engravings are being reversed and printed on the offset press, and the work looks as well as did the same job when printed from stone when the engraving was new. Many other kinds of work are being turned out successfully by the offset process—and the end is not yet.

Within five years from to-day a majority of the high-class magazines will be printed on the offset press. The thick, heavy paper which is now used by the average magazine, will have been replaced with thinner and harder stock. The illustrations will then be printed on the same kind of stock as is used for the text matter, and the magazines will be more uniform and will look better and cost considerably less to produce.

The offset press has not yet finished the work of revolutionising the lithographic trade, but it has made considerable progress.—

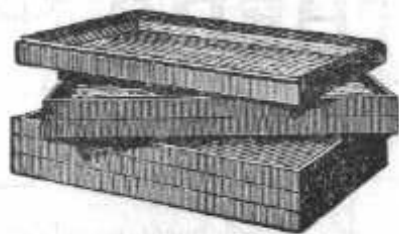
WHAT OTHERS 
ARE DOING 

THE honour of a Royal Warrant of appointment as printers to the King has been granted to Messrs. Hazell, Watson and Viney, Ltd.

The third issue of "The Imprint" is chiefly devoted to lithography. The aim is to show lithographs used as magazine illustrations—to show with what success they can be used with letterpress—in a word, whether the lithographic or typographic printing processes can be used together harmoniously. A glance through the pages, we believe, will answer this question in the affirmative. The principal articles are devoted to "Honoré Daumier"; "Lithography—Preparation of the Stone"; "Swelled Gelatine Electro Blocks"; "The House of Macmillan"; "Decoration and its Uses"; "Offset and Offset Machinery," etc. The technical articles are practical in the truest sense of the word, and altogether the issue is one that will appeal to the modern printer. As our readers are no doubt aware, "The Imprint" is published monthly at one shilling, and may be obtained from 11 Henrietta Street, or at any of the bookshops and bookstalls of W. H. Smith and Son.

The report of Cassell and Co., Ltd., after making provision for bad and doubtful debts, and providing for depreciation, etc., states that there is a profit of £32,397. The directors recommend a dividend at the rate of 3½ per cent. per annum, leaving £16,285 to be dealt with. Of this amount £8,000 was placed to reserve, £6,000 to copyright equalisation account, and £2,285 carried forward. The profit of Messrs. Perry and Co., Ltd., manufacturers of pens, etc., for the last year amounts to £71,258; for the fourth year in succession, a dividend at the rate of 20 per cent. per annum has been declared. The profits of *Country Life*, Ltd., for the past year, amount to £20,136; the shareholders again receive a 10 per cent. dividend and a bonus of 2½ per cent.; the reserve has been increased by £1,464, and £8,792 carried forward.

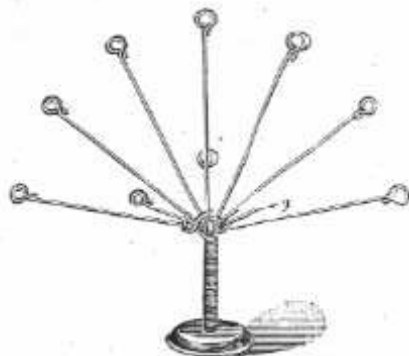

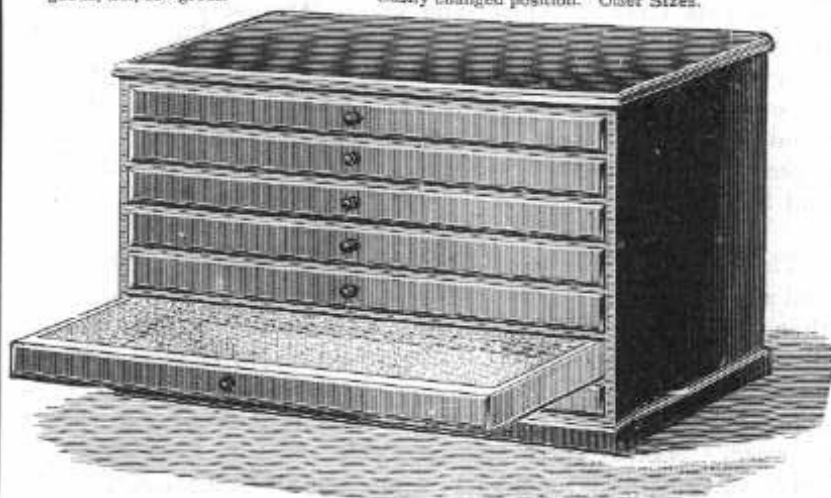

After a lapse of 77 years a dividend has been declared under the failure, which took place in 1836, of C. S. Dixon, who was then trading as a printer in the City. The winding up of his estate was complicated by a Chancery action, the outcome of which was the creation of a life interest in certain property that had belonged to the bankrupt. Recently that life interest expired, and in consequence a new situation was created. Notice is also given of a final dividend to be declared in the bankruptcy, which occurred in 1870, of H. A. Edwards, newspaper proprietor and advertising agent.

The sixty-fifth annual report of the Compositors' Society shows an increase in the funds of £2,910. The total receipts for the year were £68,948, of which £34,374 went to Unemployed Allowances, and £12,031 for Superannuation. In Law and Defence of Scale £2,570 was disbursed. Emigration expenses amounted to £1,079, and Funerals £2,815. The total state of the Society's funds was £48,802, which is a substantial increase over the preceding year. The total membership numbered 11,804, showing a decline during the year of 246.

More than twenty million stamps ordered by the United States Government, to commemorate the opening of the Panama Canal, have been withdrawn owing to an error.

A party of about twenty members of the British International Association of Journalists have been visiting Portugal, on one of those missions which it is hoped will lead to still friendlier relationships between the two countries.
