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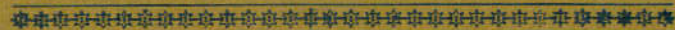

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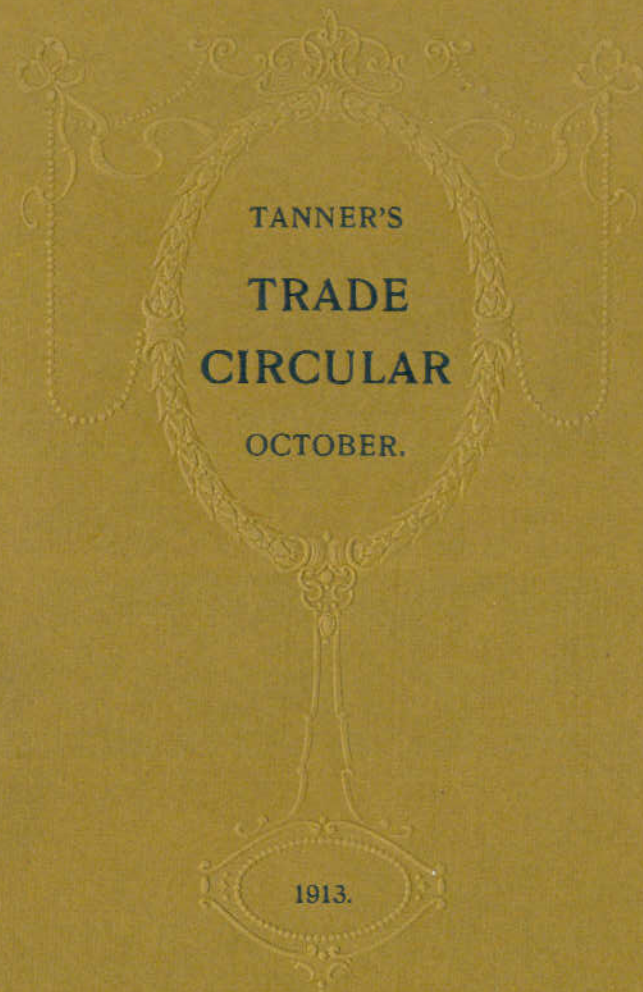

TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

AS the winter session is commencing at the various technical institutes throughout the country, we would again draw the attention of the members of the trade to the value of such classes, both from the point of view of the employer and the employed. We know of several instances where master printers have induced their assistants to join these classes, and have found in consequence that the standard of their out-put has been increased. For instance, every up-to-date compositor who is alive to the possibilities of his craft should have some knowledge of art and colour, and this can be secured at a very nominal rate at a large number of centres throughout the country. Special classes are also being held in connection with printing, and, although these were not attended so well as was anticipated last session, it is hoped that they will receive more support during the winter of 1913. From the syllabus of such classes we can only come to one conclusion, namely, that they are pre-eminently practical, and that they must prove of very great assistance to the employees attending them. In a strictly competitive age, it cannot be denied that technical education is of primary importance, and as nowadays every facility is offered for the employee who is anxious to make progress in his business, master printers should foster the spirit of education as far as they possibly can among their assistants, for it will, in the long-run, redound to their credit.

NEWS IN BRIEF

TO commemorate his jubilee with the firm of Hazell, Watson and Viney, Ltd., and as a thank-offering for the success of the business, Mr. Walter Hazell, J.P., made a gift of £7,000 for the benefit of his workpeople. No hint of the celebration had leaked out, and the old servants of the Company were surprised to receive envelopes enclosing four weeks' wages. These gifts amounted to a little over £2,000, and the remaining £5,000 was handed to trustees, to be held by them as a trust fund for the benefit of the employees. In a letter accompanying the gift, Mr. Hazell stated that he wished the income, of about £300 per annum, to be used for any purpose which may benefit the workpeople without sapping their independence, and especially to encourage the firm and the employees to work together for the increased welfare of the staff. The powers of the trust deed would be drawn widely, so that as changes occur in the future the fund may not become fossilised and useless.

If there is any truth in rumour, there is considerable likelihood of more new London morning and evening half-penny newspapers making their appearance in the near future. Some interesting developments have also been talked about in connection with the newspaper fight for the mastery of the provinces. This reminds us that the two evening newspapers in Carlisle have been discontinued, so that, at present, there is no evening paper in the district lying directly between Preston and Glasgow.

The London County Council has written to the Master Printers' Association, giving assurance that no lithographic or three-colour work for the Council is now being executed abroad.

The voters' lists of the various metropolitan boroughs, last year, cost £16,751. The price for printing the lists varied from £1 6s. 10½d. to 13s. 6d. per 100 names.

Regarding the initial printing and stationery work in connection with the proposed Irish Parliament, the Dublin Typographical Society demands that all such work shall be executed in the city of Dublin, and by trade unionists.

In Paris, 2,588 newspapers are published, while the number published throughout the French provinces is 3,289.

The Postmaster-General intimates that his department does not intend to pursue the proposal that registered letter envelopes on sale at post offices should be sold at the face value of the stamps they bear.

Mr. W. Howard Hazell will attend the Fifth Costs Congress of the American Printers at New Orleans. In this way he will no doubt secure a good deal of valuable information for the Second Costs Congress of British Printers, to be held early next year in this country.

The Institute of Printers has arranged an excellent programme of visits to the International Exhibitions of Amsterdam and Ghent. The party will leave on Thursday, October 9th, and return on Saturday, October 18th, and every moment of the time appears as if it will be occupied.

PRACTICAL NOTES

Running an Offset Press.

AN offset press is a fine piece of machinery, and should receive the best of care. A new machine requires thorough oiling at least two or three times a day—more if it shows the slightest tendency to run hot, or even warm. The fast-running parts particularly require constant attention with the oil-can. It is safe to say that lack of oil has caused more trouble in the press room than any other cause, and all this trouble can be obviated if the pressman will simply keep the oil on the bearings where it belongs.

Cleanliness is of great importance. Dirty wiping rags are an abomination around an offset press. Either wash them up or throw them out. The inking and damping rollers must be kept in good condition, and require nice adjustment, so that their pressure is not too great upon the printing surface. Wash and scrape the dampers twice a day. Considerably less moisture is required on the offset than on the flatbed. Do not trust to excessive moisture working away in the running, but take the dampers out and scrape them.

Don't condemn a new blanket before giving it a fair trial. A new blanket will stretch in spite of all that anyone can do. Tighten the blanket just before you start up the press. After a few sheets have been run, try it and see if any more "slack" can be taken out. A slack blanket will cause blurred impressions and lots of other trouble. Remember that the blanket of an offset press will print the little dots and specks just as well as it does the regular image, so look out that no dirt or finger marks are left on the plate. A finger mark that is not visible on the plate will show on the printed sheet very plainly.

The rubber roller is finding warm advocates in the offset field. If you use them, do not wash them with kerosene or benzine. Oil of this kind gets into the pores of the roller and eats away the rubber, spoiling the roller. Whatever you wash them with, see that they are wiped quite dry after washing. This is a small matter, but on it depends the life of the roller.—*Harris Monthly.*

American Copyright.

An Act of Congress of March 4th, 1909, entitled "An Act to Amend and Consolidate the Acts Respecting Copyright," provides in Section 5, paragraph (k), that copyright may be claimed for prints and pictorial illustrations. The first step in securing copyright is publication of the work, which is provided for by Section 9 as follows:—

"That any person entitled thereto by this Act may secure copyright for his work by publication thereof with the notice of copyright required by this Act; and such notice should be affixed to each copy thereof published, or offered for sale in the United States by authority of the copyright proprietor."

"That the notice of copyright required for Section 9 of this Act shall consist either of the word 'Copyright' or the abbreviation 'Copr.,' accompanied by the name of the copyright proprietor. . . In the case, however, of copies of works specified in sub-sections (f) to (k) inclusive, of Section 5 of this Act, the notice may consist of the letter C enclosed within a circle, thus (C), accompanied by the initials, monogram, mark, or symbol of the copyright proprietor: Provided that on some accessible portion of such copies, or of the margin, back, permanent base, or pedestal, or of the substance on which such copies shall be mounted, his name shall appear."

After publication, the next step is to secure registration of the claim to copyright, which should be done promptly after publication. This is provided for under Section 10 of the Act by the terms of which two complete copies of the best edition of the work must be sent to the Copyright Office, with a proper application for registration correctly filled out and a money order for the amount of the legal fee. The fee for copyright in this case is one dollar.—*The British Printer.*

WHAT OTHERS ARE DOING

THE report of Messrs. Trotter and Sons, Ltd., Chirnside Paper Mill, shows a profit of £8,353 os. 7d. A dividend of 5 per cent. was paid on the preference shares, £3,000 was written off for depreciation, and £3,654 19s. 5d., less directors' fees, was carried forward. The report of the directors of Messrs. Mason and Mason, Ltd., printing ink makers, shows a gross profit of £15,600. After deducting various charges, the net profit is £100, as against a loss for the previous year of £700. The profits of the Aberdeen University Press, Ltd., amount to £4,351, which, with the balance of £979 brought forward from last year, gives £5,330 for appropriation. The directors recommended that £2,000 be written off for machinery and plant, £500 deducted for heritable property, and a dividend be paid on the ordinary shares at the rate of 2½ per cent. per annum, leaving £805 to be carried forward. It is satisfactory to be able to report that the profits of Messrs. George Newnes, Ltd., increased this year by £32,000. Recognising that their employees have had something to do with improving the position of the Company, the directors have set aside £2,500 for distribution among the staff as a special bonus.

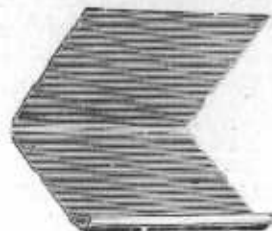
According to the *Sales and Wants Advertiser*, many complaints are being made by the paper makers in Germany that they are not obtaining prices to compensate them for the heavy cost price of production. There appears to have been an over-production, which the German market could not digest, and experts predicted some time ago that the export trade must also suffer. This has very promptly proved true, and many pulp and paper mills are said to have been working for some time at a heavy loss. There is great competition amongst the manufacturers for any orders that are going. The complaints of over-production in German paper circles are not without echoes in other countries, such as Scandinavia, in which country many makers also have been led, by the hope of ensuing business, to enlarge their works.

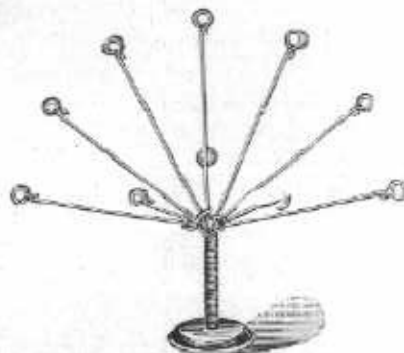

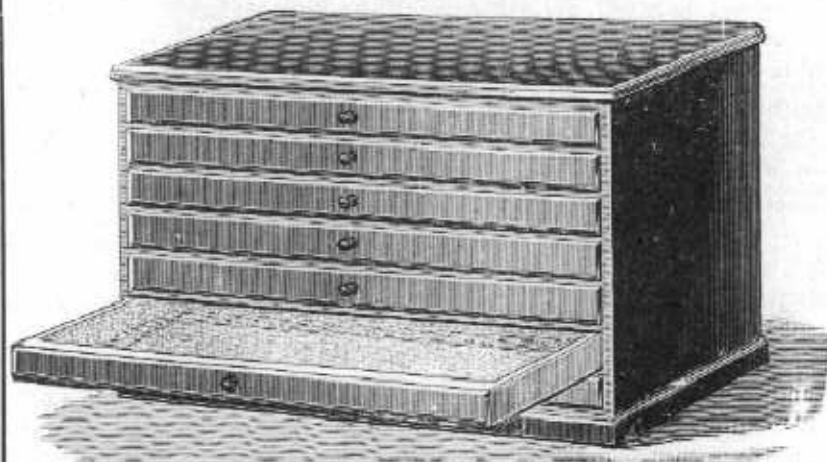
