THE PARLIAMENTARY BILLS

THREE Bills are being submitted to Parliament this session dealing with the question of the storage and handling of celluloid, namely, the London County Council (General Powers) Bill, the City of London (Various Powers) Bill, and the Glasgow Corporation Bill. The wording of the London Bills for all practical purposes is identical, and the same powers are sought in both cases. The City Fathers, in addition, desire all celluloid articles to be distinctly marked or labelled "Celluloid, Inflammable." The Glasgow Corporation Bill is a little more drastic than the London Bills in certain details, but from the point of view of the printing trade they are all very similar. The dates on which the Bills, if passed, shall become operative is April 1st, 1915, but we understand opposition is to be made from other trades, and in view of the Report of the Celluloid Committee, we believe it would be advisable for the printing trade to carefully consider the situation. It is now too late to oppose the Glasgow Bill, and if any opposition is to be made by the trade to the London Bills, it is necessary for it to be lodged by the middle of the month.

Clause 27 of the L.C.C. Bill states: It shall not be lawful (*b*) for any person to use any premises for the purpose of a celluloid store unless the name of such person, the address of the premises so used, and a description of the trade or business conducted therein are registered with the Council. The fee for registration is 10s. 6d. According to the definitions, "celluloid store" means any premises upon which for the purpose of sale, hire or profit:

(a) Celluloid is subjected to or used in any process of manufacture.

(c) Celluloid which has not been subjected to or used in any process of manufacture is kept or stored in quantities at any one time exceeding in the aggregate 112 pounds in weight.

Under the heading "celluloid store" it is stated that celluloid shall not be stored or handled in such quantity, or in such manner, as to endanger the means of ready escape in case of fire: that the authorities may prescribe precautions to be observed in the storing and use of celluloid: that they may make requirements as to the provision of fire extinguishing appliances: that they may make provision with regard to the execution and maintenance of works, and to any other matters

whatsoever which they deem expedient with a view to diminution of danger to life and property. The most important clause, however, is as follows: Prohibit or make subject to the consent of the Council the use for the purposes of a celluloid store of any part of any premises which is situate anywhere beneath any room in such premises which is used for residential purposes or in which persons are employed, and empower the Council to attach conditions to any such consent. Now what does this mean? If it means what it says, it means nothing more nor less than that a "celluloid store" shall only be conducted either in a one-storey building, or on the top floor of the premises. In addition, the Council seek the power of compelling the owner of the building to make the necessary provision for the adequate means of escape, and as the owner is the person who receives for the time being the rack-rent, we can see some delicate legal situations between owners and ground landlords.

From the above it will be seen that the powers sought for in all the Bills are as wide as it is possible to make them, and if they are passed without stringent modifications it will be next to impossible to use celluloid for any purpose in connection with the printing industry. The only sop which the London Authorities give is that the regulations shall not come into force until they have been confirmed by a Secretary of State. We should imagine that the trade will not allow such a drastic state of affairs to exist without strenuous opposition, having regard to the fact that celluloid is being used more and more in the printing trade.

There is no doubt, in view of the recent report of the Celluloid Commission, that some form of legislation will be introduced, but so long as it does not unduly harass the trade no one will complain. Considering the matter from every point of view, we are of opinion that general legislation in this matter is preferable to local legislation, for it is certainly unfair that a trade in one town should be under regulations, and that a trader in another town should be immune. He is at a disadvantage in every way, and unable to enter, on all fours, in healthy trade competition which is the soul of every business.

News in Brief

THE will of Mr. T. B. Philip of Messrs. Philip, Son & Nephew, Liverpool, shows an estate valued at £26,554; that of Mr. Septimus Vaughan Morgan of the firm of Messrs. Morgan Bros., proprietors of *The Ironmonger* and *The Chemist and Druggist*, at £325,223, and that of Mr. P. R. Crompton, paper maker, Bury, at £117,607 gross, with net personalty of £116,925.

The Lord Mayor will preside at the 87th Anniversary Festival of the Printers' Pension Corporation at the Connaught Rooms on May 13th.

It is announced that Mr. Evan Spicer has retired from his position as a Director of Messrs. James Spicer and Sons, Ltd., and that Mr. Bennet Burleigh has retired from the staff of *The Daily Chronicle*.

At a recent meeting of the Dover Town Council, one of the Councillors objected to what he considered "the enormous expense in printing." As the annual bill for printing and stationery was only £1,300, there seems to be little cause for complaint.

The 15th Annual General Meeting of the Institute of Printers will be held on February 25th, at St. Bride Foundation, at 7 P.M., and on March 26th the annual Bohemian Concert will be held at the same Institution. It might interest many of our readers to know the objects for which the Institute of Printers is formed. They are to furnish a social and business centre for employers and representative men employed or interested in the various associated crafts; to aid, promote, assist, extend and encourage the study and practice of the art of printing and its kindred trades by periodical meetings, and by other means; the formation of benevolent, orphan, and annuity funds; the creation of a court of arbitration; the encouragement and development of philanthropic work; the reading of papers and discussion of social and technical questions of the day; the organisation of debates, social evenings, "At Homes," entertainments, and other functions for recreative purposes. TANNER'S TRADE CIRCULAR

According to *The Sales and Wants Advertiser*, no fewer than 30,000 applications were made during last year for Patents in Great Britain and Ireland, the total being roughly the same as during 1912. One is for a paper wardrobe, consisting of an airtight bag made of paper, in which wearing apparel may be enclosed.

The Imports of paper-making materials into the United Kingdom during last year amounted to £5,815,576, as against £5,566,996 of the preceding year. The Exports for last year were £959,645, as against £927,668 for the previous year.

What will prove to be an excellent series of Lectures on book-binding are being given by Mr. D. Cockerell at the Central School of Arts and Crafts, Southampton Row, during this month. The first was delivered on January 30th, and the remainder will be given on the 6th, 13th, 20th and 27th February, and the 6th March at 8 P.M. The Lectures will deal with an historical review of the craft, as well as methods, folding, sewing, materials, decorations, &c., and the mutual dependence of book-binding and printing on one another.

Speaking recently on the subject of advertising, Lord Northcliffe estimated that 100,000 persons were connected with the art in this country. He said there was nothing new about advertising, as Rameses stamped his mark on the national monuments of Egypt—the worst form of publicity, that of personal notoriety—and King Charles advertised in *The London Gazette* for his lost dog.

THE PROCESS YEAR BOOK

PENROSE'S *Pictorial Annual or The Process Year Book* for 1913-14 is as interesting and as instructive as usual. It is published by Percy Lund, Humphries and Co, Ltd. and gives an excellent idea of the progress made in printing during the year. The illustrations throughout are excellent, and in many cases unique; the articles are pre-eminently practical, being contributed by authorities in the craft, and altogether this year's Annual is one which should be seen and perused by every up-to-date printer. In his preface on the year's progress in process work, the editor, Mr. William Gamble, F.R.P.S., states that rotary photogravure has made a wonderful advancement, and is now being used extensively for daily and weekly newspapers. Whilst this does not apply in this country it applies to Germany and Holland and France, where several newspapers are wholly printed, both as to text and illustration, by the intaglio process. In this way it is gradually ousting the half-tone process from popular favour, and tends to show that in the near future half-tones will be displaced to a considerable extent in illustrated books and journals. Mr. Gamble says that it seems to be conclusively proved that intaglio-printed illustrations have hit the public taste better than half-tones. There is an artistic quality and a photographic richness of tone in the former that has never been secured in half-tone, even with such aids as matt papers and matt or double-tone inks. The writer then goes on to give the advantages and relative cost of intaglio, and its adaptability for newspaper work, and holds the opinion that while the initial outlay may be a little more, when all things are taken into account the cost of illustrating and printing with intaglio is no greater than with half-tone. He further states that if it should be ultimately found possible to print both the text and the illustrations from the intaglio-engraved cylinder, then a great revolution in newspaper production will be witnessed, and the present newspaper rotaries, with their stereo plant and other cumbrous accessories, will be scrapped. At the same time, Mr. Gamble appears rather sceptical about the matter, for he can see no possibility of the intaglio process being so quickened that it can equal the time now taken to stereotype the formes. The process is also making advancement in the direction of using it for colour work, and here again the supremacy of the half-tone block is threatened. As regards offset lithographic printing, Mr. Gamble says that it continues to claim widespread interest and attention, but it is difficult to discover the extent of the progress that is being made in the application to it of photographic processes. In this connection attention is drawn by the writer to a new grain process, invented by Mr. J. Gaskin Wood, of Edinburgh, which is claimed to be simple, certain and cheap.

What Others are Doing.

A SOMEWHAT remarkable newspaper amalgamation was announced last month. *The Gentlewoman* has taken over subscribers of no fewer than three other weekly papers, namely, *Madame*, *The Throne* and *The Onlooker*. Their subscribers are, by an Agreement of the Liquidator, receiving *The Gentlewoman* each week.

According to *The Daily Chronicle*, Messrs. Eyre and Spottiswoode have twenty men in their employ whose services total 1108 years. More than one half of them are freemen of the City of London and of the Stationers' Company. The oldest worker has 68 years of service to his credit, and the youngest 50 years.

The Directors of Messrs. Waterlow and Sons, Ltd. announced a final dividend of 10 per cent. on the ordinary shares, and a bonus of 2 per cent., making 17 per cent. for the year. The report of Messrs. Eyre and Spottiswoode, Ltd., shows an available balance of £23,572. The dividends on the preference shares have been paid, and £10,282 has been set aside for depreciations. The report of the Amalgamated Press, Ltd., shows a profit of £372,329, after writing off £25,000 for depreciation, as against £263,283 in the preceding year. A dividend has been declared equivalent to 40 per cent. per annum, and a bonus has been recommended, which will enable the present holders of ordinary shares to acquire new fully-paid ordinary shares at par, at the rate of three such shares for every ten ordinary shares held by them. It was also decided to reduce the balance of goodwill and copyright by £40,000. The Annual General Meeting of Lanston Monotype Corporation, Ltd., was held under the Presidency of the Earl of Dunraven, who stated that £25,000 had been added to reserve, and £24,026 carried forward. It was decided to recommend a dividend at the rate of 2½ per cent. for the half year, making 5 per cent. for the year.

The paper mills in Australia are now said to be able to produce two thousand tons of paper annually.

The average output of *The Evening News* is 6,500 to 7,500 per minute. The publishing alone of this newspaper occupies a staff of 800 men and 40 motor cars.

At the last meeting of the Printers' Mutual Aid Association, Mr. C. W. Bowerman, M.P., stated that there had been a considerable increase in the subscribing membership, but despite the increased income the expenditure had slightly exceeded it, and the funds in hand stood at £390.

A stationer in Atlantic City has opened a department for puzzles, and so far the venture has proved most profitable.

To supply the demand for lead pencils in the United States no less than 110,000 tons of cedar wood is used annually. This amount is sufficient for an output of 350 million pencils.

It has been decided by the Readers Pensions Committee to commemorate the work of the late Mr. Wm. Hilton by establishing a William Hilton Memorial Pension. As the Committee think that many of his friends would like to be associated in the memorial, subscriptions will be gladly received by the Hon. Sec., Mr. W. H. Shortell, St. Bride Institute, E.C.

The last half-yearly report of the Co-operative Printing Society, Ltd. is again very satisfactory. The work done is as follows: Manchester, sales, £21,213, stock, £3,014, and work in progress, £1,203; Newcastle-on-Tyne, sales £9,746, stock, £2,045, work in progress, £1,200; London, sales, £27,362, stock, £1,430, work in progress, £2,060. The total profit was £6,653. The share capital received a dividend of 5 per cent. and a bonus of 2½ per cent. £776 was allocated as dividend on trade and £456 as bonus on wages, the balance going to depreciation and to the benevolent funds.
