THE PARLIAMENTARY BILLS

ATENTION was called in our last issue to the Parliamentary Bills affecting the use of celluloid at present before Parliament. They are the London County Council (General Powers) Bill; the City of London (Various Powers) Bill, and the Glasgow Corporation Bill. We are pleased to find that opposition is being made to all these bills, although we regret that the printing trade has not taken any effective steps to safeguard its interests. The opposition comes from the London Chamber of Commerce, the Kinematograph trade, and the Xylonite Company, and other individual firms. From what we can see the line of opposition is similar in all cases, namely, that the provisions asked for are too drastic, and that if allowed to pass, they would seriously hamper the industries represented. It cannot be denied that the authorities have drafted the clauses in their Bills without any regard whatsoever to the requirements of the various trades concerned. When we say that they would affect at least forty-two important industries, and make it impossible for some of them to continue in business, some idea may be obtained of the seriousness of the situation. In the form as drafted it is impossible for them to pass unless the Government desires a commercial revolution such as has never been seen in this country. There is no public need for such drastic conditions as are suggested, and it only proves how officialdom seizes at any straw to increase its desire for supervision and control. The Celluloid Committee have issued a report on the whole matter, and it would be in accordance with precedent for the Home Office to suggest a public Bill if it is thought that there is any public need for legislation. This is the attitude which should certainly be taken by the trade, if its members are at all anxious to work for the good of the whole community. We understand that representations are to be made to the Home Office on the lines indicated above, judging from the tone of the opposition to the Parliamentary Bills at present before the House.

News in Brief

WE would draw the attention of our readers to a special clearance line of 400 reams 70lb. Attention has been drawn in our pages to the series of weekly lectures which are being given at the St. Bride Foundation by Mr. R. A. Peddie. In the first lecture Mr. Peddie dealt with printing during the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries. The earliest printed documents which had survived were a Papal Indulgence, date 1454. Up to 1465 all the type was Gothic in character, but at that date Roman characters began to be adopted in Germany. The first Greek text to appear in print was Homer's "Battle of the Frogs and the Mice," which was printed in Brescia, the only copy of which is preserved in the John Rylands Library, Manchester. Our Mr. Garrett possesses an exceptionally good water-colour painting of this somewhat peculiar subject.

THE crusade continues against vulgar postcards, the latest phase being the suggestion of a censorship to be run somewhat on the lines of the one established in the moving picture industry.

Esparto grass is still in great demand for paper-making. During last year the imports amounted to 204,932 tons, which is about 6,000 tons in advance of the previous year.

Some interesting details concerning Government printing were given to the paper in question recently by a member of a large printing firm. "Such work is a big strain for all concerned," he said. "The work in itself is exhausting. For instance, during a parliamentary session, if any member requires a certain piece of information, and the Secretary of a Department or Under Secretary is unable to give it at once, the printers are told often just as they are going away for the night. It is necessary for them to print the answers at once, and this means working all night. When the Insurance Act became law, a vast amount of printing was necessary. Over 20,000,000 cards had to be printed, and for six months our men worked day and night, and the worry and anxiety were considerable."

Practical Notes

WHAT BLACK INKS TO USE

THE ink makes or mars a printed job. A high-grade ink causes the impression to stand out on even cheap paper, but no expenditure of skill can make a cheap ink look well on high-grade paper. By using cover black ink on the cheapest bond paper a decent job may be had, but cheap ink on high-grade bond paper is an utter failure and the money spent for good paper is wasted so far as the look of the job is concerned.

The above applies to the forme as well as the paper. The pressman may be given a forme of brand new type and half-tone or line cuts to print. If low-grade ink not suited to the paper is used the result is bound to be disappointing, but with the right ink the same pressman can turn out a neat job from a forme of worn type and plates.

There is one general rule in the choice of inks that is safe to follow in nearly all cases when the finished appearance of the job is of more importance than quick drying or economy, and this rule is always to use the stiffest, heaviest bodied ink the paper will stand without "picking." In other words a cover black ink is the best black ink to use on any paper on which it does not "pick." Next best is a bond black and then comes a high-grade job black.

Temperature affects the viscosity of varnish, and the working quality of ink depends principally on the varnish in which its pigment has been ground. On a very cold morning it is quite impossible to use cover black on coated paper because the cold makes the varnish too stiff, and it picks the coated paper; but when the temperature is above eighty-five degrees, as it often is in many press-rooms in both winter and summer, cover black will work on coated paper and look better than any other black except engravers' proving black at from three to five dollars per pound.

On any black job, be it a business card, letterhead or edition de luxe, where fine appearance regardless of expense is the aim, it is well to use cover black or, if the finish of the paper is too weak for so stiff an ink, cover black reduced with high-grade job or half-tone ink as may be necessary. On half-tone formes on coated paper cover black softened just enough to stop picking with a purplish blue-like roslyn or reflex blue will work smoothly at low temperature and beat any half-tone ink in appearance.

When rapid drying is the end in view a high-grade combination or job black is the ink to use on all papers. It looks well on all papers except bond, ledger and hard, rough Covers, and on these papers it looks passable if some purplish blue is added.

What Others are Doing ❖

PAPER mills generally appear to be in a satisfactory financial position. At the last annual meeting of the North of Ireland Paper Mill Co., a dividend was declared at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum, for the half year to December 31st, and £47,685 was carried forward. The Guard Bridge Paper Co., Ltd., has also declared an interim dividend for the half-year ending December 31st at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum. The East Lancashire Paper Mill Co. states that the net profit for the half-year is £9,513. A dividend of 10s. and bonus of 5s. per share was declared on the ordinary and preference shares, and 2s. 6d. per share on the £5 bonus shares, £37,946 being carried forward.

The pulp and paper industry in Canada appears to be in a thriving condition, judging by the reports which have recently been issued. The output of the mills is 1,500 tons daily of newsprint, of which quantity 1,000 tons daily is exported to the United States. Further mills are in course of erection, and everything goes to prove that the industry is becoming a very important one in our self-governing colony.

With reference to the forthcoming Printing Exhibition which is to be held in May next, Mr. Bridges has received acceptances to attend the exhibition from leading printers in Australia, India, China, Japan, Canada and Malta.

The following groups will be represented at the forthcoming International Exhibition at Leipzig: Etching and photography, design, printing and trade book production, bookbinding, writing materials and stationery, literature, music and music publishing, posters and advertisements. Negotiations are under way to have a special pavilion for the exhibits of Dutch printers and lithographers.

A German magazine, *Nach Feierabend* (After Working Hours) has a list of subscribers numbering over one million. An extra week's salary was given to all the employees to celebrate the million mark.

A stationer has been summoned at Liverpool for selling a fountain pen on the stationer's weekly half-holiday, holding the opinion that a fountain pen was not stationery, and that they were supplied by

tobacconists, jewellers, &c. The stipendary held the opinion that a pen was stationery.

The directors of Messrs. Perry and Co., Ltd., pen manufacturers, have had another successful year. A dividend has been declared on the ordinary shares of 7½ per cent., making 15 per cent. for the year, free of Income Tax, and a bonus of 1s. per share, also free of Income Tax, has been recommended, making a distribution equal to 20 per cent. for the year, which is the same as last year. £12,000 was written off goodwill, and £3,059 carried forward. An interim dividend at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum has been declared by the directors of Messrs. George Newnes, Ltd., and the directors of Messrs. Raphael Tuck and Sons, Ltd. have declared an interim dividend at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum.

The Daily Chronicle states that newspaper boys who hit on a good pitch can earn from 30s. to £3 a week, and even youngsters without a pitch can generally reckon on from 10s. to 20s. a week. Pitches outside stations and tram termini are valuable, and have been sold at anything up to £100.

It is announced that *Puck*, the American humorous weekly, has been bought by Mr. J. R. Straus for £12,000, and will be taken over by him in May next.

Messrs. Riviere, the bookbinders, have recently issued what is without doubt one of the most beautiful specimens yet produced of the art of the illuminator. The subject is "Romeo and Juliet," and is written in old English lettering, and illuminated throughout by Mr. A. Sangovski. It has taken 18 months to produce. The binding is in pink Levant morocco, and is studded with 214 rubies, 36 amethysts, and 150 pearls. The price runs well into four figures.
