St. Bride Foundation Printing School

The removal of St. Bride Foundation Printing School from its home in Bride Lane to more commodious quarters across the river has only been accepted by the printing houses. in the neighbourhood of Fleet Street as a matter of extreme necessity. For some time the School has outgrown the accommodation available in St. Bride Institute in which it was born 28 years ago, and though the neighbourhood has been searched for larger premises nothing suitable has been discovered. So the School is to re-assemble in September under a new roof in Stamford Street, which though well within the printing area and in fact not very far removed, is not quite so central as the old situation in the very heart of Pressland. The severance with St. Bride Foundation is regrettable, but success has its penalties and, after all, the cause is the only thing that counts. There are some comforts and compensations in the change, The School carries with it the indefatigable and capable Principal to whom it owes its success, and with him go also the whole staff of practical and experienced instructors, so continuity of policy and the prospect of still further development are both assured. Then the new start is under far more favourable conditions as regards space and equipment. The promoters of the scheme have planned on large and far-seeing lines. The old St. Bride Printing School with its local associations is blossoming out as the London School of Printing and Kindred Trades-formerly the St. Bride's Printing Schoola title which sufficiently indicates both its scope and its ideals. Perhaps the most interesting feature in the new venture, and the one most fraught with possibilities, is the new management under the anspices of the London County Council. The Governing Body is composed mainly of representatives of the Printing Trade, linking up the whole industry with the provision of thoroughly trained and efficient workers. The newspaper offices and the large printing firms are associated with the Printers and Allied Unions in a common endeavour to faster the right spirit as well as the best craftsmanship in the younger generation. It is a revival under modern conditions of the functions of the old City Companies and Guilds, and

And that's that.

The will of Mr. D. L. Pressly, of York, for eighteen years managing editor of the Yorkshire Herald, who died on April 11th, shows an estate valued at £2,270; that of Sir J. Scott, of the Walter Scott Publishing Co., Ltd., at £582,165; that of Mr. W. Howard, of Leeds, a superannuated member of the Leeds Typographical Association, at £2,450; that of Mr. G. E. B. Eyre, chairman and managing director of Messis. Eyre & Spottiswoode, Ltd., at £490,221; that of Mr. A. Elliott, bookseller and stationer, of Edinburgh, who published R. L. Stevenson's first book, "The Pentland Rising," at £13,778; that of Mr. C. Mitchell, printer, West Harding Street, E.C., at £6,142; that of Mr. W. Llewelly Williams, K.C., M.P., Recorder of Cardiff and journalist, at £507; and that of Sir J. Williams Bens, founder of the firm of Bens Bros., trade journal publishers, at £7,375.

Mr. Howard Hazell, presiding at the annual meeting of Hazell, Watson & Vinex, Ltd., stated that the past year had been one of extraordinary difficulty. The general commercial depression had seriously reduced the demand for printing of all kinds, and it was impossible to keep the plant fully at work. The profits had dropped from £40,812 to £30,171. Continuing, he stated that the great increase in the rate of wages and other expenses make the use of up-to-date and labour-saving machinery and methods more essential than in the years before the war. Employers must see that their factories were well organised and equipped, and the employees must do their part in maintaining the highest possible output from the plant, and assist in preventing waste of time and materials.

of Parliament. This practice not only deprives our own Post Office of revenue, but it also plays into the hands of foreign printers. Replying to a question in the House, the Assistant Postmaster-General hoped, in view of the reduction on inland printed papers to the pre-war rate of 1d., that the practice would be discontinued, but if it continued Parliament would be asked to grant additional powers in order to bring about its cessation.


The Paper Trade Review says: -" The strength of paper or fibre board varies greatly according to the amount of moisture in it, and this amount is continually changing with the atmospheric conditions. As the relative humidity of the air increases the strength of fibre board declines very rapidly. A piece of corrugated board tested at the Forest Products Laboratory showed a decrease in strength, by the Mullen test, of 59 per cent, when the relative humidity was raised from 65 to 97 per cent."

Last month, in the House of Commons, on a vote of £1,779,957 for the Stationery Office, SIR D. MACLEAN drew attention to the fact that the expenditure on this department was two and a half times what it was before the war. He moved the reduction of the vote by £100. Sir J. Baird said that when the experiment of Government printing had been three years in operation a full enquiry into the results would be held.

This reminds us that a letter on the same subject has been addressed to the Chancellor of the Exchequer by the Federation of British Industries, signed by its president, Col. O. C. ARMSTRONG. The following reply was received:-

"The Chancellor recognises that an inquiry into the advantage or otherwise of printing being directly undertaken by the State will in due course be desirable. He is, however, of opinion that such an inquiry could not be conducted satisfactorily until fuller experience has been gained as to the results of the operations of the Government Printing Press. He notes the readiness of your Federation to afford assistance when such an inquiry is instituted, and he has no doubt that

full opportunity will be given to all interested parties to submit evidence.

"In the meantime, the Chancellor is satisfied that, having acquired the Government Printing Press, no other course is open to the Government than to make full use of facilities thus possessed by them for executing printing work. He would, however, point out that only a proportion of the printing required for Government departments is carried out at the Government Printing Press, the larger part of the work still being executed by private firms."

Exports of paper for the first six months of this year show a marked increase over the figures for the corresponding period of last year. The values of the imports for the same periods are about the same.

According to the Daily Chronicle, the paper on which Treasury notes are printed is made within twenty miles of London. The mill is a small one, employing about 300 people, of whom nearly half are women. It has long had a reputation for the excellence of its hand-made paper; nothing else is produced, and when the Government decided to issue paper money the contract for notes of the smaller denomination was placed here, and has remained ever since. Nothing but the finest rags is used in the production of the paper, which must be light yet tough; every sheet is subjected to a breaking strain of 60 lb. before it is passed. Each process of manufacture is guarded with meticulous care, and there is an almost tiresome counting and recounting of the sheets before they emerge as the finished article and are handed over to the representatives of the Treasury. It says much for the system that only one sheet, sufficient to print twenty notes, has gone astray. Hope has not yet died that some day this derelict may be found to round off a record which is well-nigh perfect.

Railway rates will be reduced on August 1st, thanks to the perseverance of the F.B.I. The aim was to secure a reduction to 50 per cent. above pre-war rates, and the result is a general lowering on the merchandise traffic to 75 per cent. above the rates in operation on January 14th, 1920, on English and Welsh railways.

ARTIFICIAL ILLUMINATION FOR COLOUR PRINTING.

HAT colour matching is difficult in artificial light, is known to everyone. Whether it be a piece of ribbon or a suiting, daylight is invariably sought to make quite sure of the shade.

The colour printer endeavours to arrange his factory so that the machine room can be assured of a plentiful supply of daylight. But few people, whether laymen or printers, realise how very important is the form of artificial light employed when dealing with colour in any form, and the reasons for difficulties which occur under unsatisfactory conditions.

Among common artificial illuminants the nearest approximation to daylight is the open electric arc, and the various kinds of gas-filled, or so-called half-watt lamps, which are of comparatively recent introduction; but these by no means satisfy the requirements of colour matching. Many attempts have been made to make artificial light sources similar to daylight by the use of correcting screens made of glass tinted blue, which does not allow the excess of yellow rays to be transmitted. One daylight lamp at present on the market obtains the desired result by cutting off all direct rays and using a multi-coloured reflector arranged in such a way that the necessary correction is obtained. But in this case the loss in illumination is excessive, because such a large proportion of the original light is wasted in the reflector.

Among the most successful and practical "daylight lamps" is the "Osram," a gas-filled half-watt lamp made by the General Electric Co., Ltd. In this lamp no screens or reflectors are required; all that is necessary is for the lamp itself to be placed in an ordinary lamp socket and switched on. It will thus be realised that, compared with other daylight lamps, it is very simple to use. The actual glass of which the bulb is constructed has been made to the necessary shade of blue instead of being white.

The lamp being gas-filled, and therefore of the half-watt type, represents the most economical and modern form of electric lighting, combined with its special colour properties.
