Tanner's Trade Circular

A SEQUEL.

IT will be remembered that we recently drew attention, in somewhat caustic terms, to the "Printed in Munich" circulars issued and posted in Germany by the Free Church Touring Guild, of London. The matter was commented upon at some length in the Press, and as an outcome, and as a protest against the policy pursued by the guild, the President, Dr. J. Scott-Lidgett, and two of the Vice-Presidents, Sir Donald Maclean and Dr. F. B. Meyer, have resigned. We congratulate these gentlemen on their action, as it will no doubt have a deterring effect on the future policy of any organisation who contemplate ordering their printing abroad, whilst there is so much unemployment in the country.

This incident, together with others of a similar character, have at last wakened up the Post Office authorities, with the result that it is gratifying to find that the practice of posting circulars, etc., on the Continent, destined for recipients in this country, is to be dealt with by legislation. Sir William Joynson-Hicks stated in the House a few days ago that with regard to the practice of posting abroad, he is having a Bill prepared to deal with the matter, which he hopes to introduce at an early date. There can be no doubt but that legislation is the only effective means to combat any insidious attempt to interfere with the nation's purse and seek an advantage through channels which an overwhelming majority of the public strongly resent. As several of the trade journals say, "Printers will view with approval the endeavour to prevent a practice which not only robs our own postal service of its dues but also puts an unfair advantage into the hands of the British printer's foreign competitors." Don't let us be misunderstood—we are not whining against competition—on the contrary, we welcome it as the soul of business—but we do object to any firm being allowed to "play" who, flagrantly, and on every conceivable occasion, breaks the "rules of the game."

News in Brief

Some controversy is taking place in official circles as to the use of ordinary envelopes for unsealed postal packets proving "traps" for letters. The P.M.G. is making suggestions relative to the matter and is to impose regulations. The new Customs Tariff came into operation in the Irish Free State last month and includes *inter-alia* English-made playing cards, which are subject to 33¹/₂ per cent *ad val.*

LORD RIDDELL, Sir Chas. Wakefield, Bart., and Mr. Augustine Birrell have been unanimously elected honorary life members of the London Press Club. The late chairman claims that during the past year the Club's standing and prestige have been greatly enhanced, and that never before had it played so big a part in the social life of London.

Arrangements have been made by the Thirty Club, of London, for an influential delegation of business men to attend the Convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, which is to be held at Atlantic City in June next.

The reports we have had from the Leipzig fair go to prove that this country has little or nothing to learn from Germany relative to colour printing. Yet we read now and again that England is far behind and that orders are going abroad in increasing numbers. If this be so it is for the reason that the cost may be lower, as the technique cannot be higher. Some times we wonder whether insidious propaganda has not something to do with these occasional outbursts of enthusiasm for foreign competitors.

At the conference of the INDEPENDENT LABOUR PARTY some criticism was made regarding the salary—£1,000—paid to Mr. H. N. Brailsford as editor of *The New Leader*, the organ of the party. A delegate said it was a big jump from the salary previously paid of £150. The chairman said he thought the criticism un-generous. If they were to try to undercut rates in the journalistic profession they were seriously open to the charge that the whole philosophy of their movement rested on a mood of jealousy.

SIR PHILIP DAWSON, M.P. asked the Chancellor recently, in the House, when his promised inquiry would be set up relating to the State Printing Works at Harrow. Mr. Baldwin replied that for the purposes of the inquiry which will be made into the working of the State factory at Harrow it will be necessary to have the complete accounts for the financial year ending March 31st. As soon as these accounts are ready the inquiry can be set up, but it will probably be several weeks after the end of the financial year before the complete accounts are available.

VENTILATION AND HEALTH.

Issued by the Health Committee with the approval of the Joint Industrial Council of the Printing and Allied Trades.



ONE of the main causes of ill-health and lack of energy amongst workers is the want of proper methods of ventilation in the works. To enable them to use their powers to the highest capacity the air they breathe must be pure. In other conditions, owing to the lack of fresh air, their physical energy is reduced or they have to use greater effort than is normally necessary in order to produce a given amount of work.

Close and stuffy rooms tends to sleepiness, and this condition is fatal to efficient and economic work. In the interest alike of employer and employed fresh air should be provided. There is little doubt that one of the principal causes of the excessive number of fatal cases of tuberculosis amongst workers in the printing trade is the vitiated air they breathe in works not provided with efficient means of ventilation, or in which the the means installed are not utilised by the workers.

In many up-to-date works sufficient exhaust fans are provided. In others, ventilation depends upon the opening of windows or air outlets, and through fear of cold and draughts there is a disposition to neglect to use the means available.

There are various systems of ensuring a proper supply of fresh air, but probably the simplest and best is that of exhaust ventilation. Under this system, the air of the works is extracted by means of fans, and is renewed by the natural flow from inlets provided at suitable places some distance from the fans.

The Home Office has issued a very useful memorandum entitled "Ventilation of Factories and Workshops," which may be obtained from His Majesty's Stationery Office at the price of sixpence. Various systems are illustrated by photographs and diagrams which will be found useful in determining the method most suitable to any particular works.

SUMMARY.

Remember that lack of fresh air reduces efficiency and is a serious menace to health. Fresh air is the principal defence against tuberculosis and other diseases of the respiratory organs.

Make use of whatever means of ventilation are available in the works. Do not block up the air inlets and outlets. Draughts can be avoided by other methods.

Stagnant air is quickly deprived of its natural proportion of oxygen, which is absolutely essential to health. It becomes vitiated by the impure air which is expelled from the lungs with every breath.

Fans ensure satisfactory ventilation. See that they are used wherever they are installed.
